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TO THE

WHILE *great Writers* choose, what they call, *great Men*, for their *Patrons*; let me humbly choose the *best* of Men for mine, the *good* alone with me are great, let their Fortune and their Station be what they may.

IN this Sense, if the strictest Regard, nay, the highest Rewards paid to *Virtue* and *public Spirit*, be, as it undoubtedly is, the clearest Proof of *virtuous* and great Minds, no Men, now on Earth, can be deemed, truly *greater*, than the CITIZENS of DUBLIN.

IF the *Dedication* of any thing be a real Compliment, it is only so, when the Person, to whom the Work is *dedicated*, is truly worthy, and a fit *Patron* for the *Dedicator* and his Labors. Otherwise, it is a *Burlesque* and a *Satire* on both.

IF the Compliment of a *Dedication* be, as some *Dedicators* would have it, a *Debt*, or a *Tribute*; it can only be due to the *Good* and *Beneficent*; it is impertinent to offer it, where it is not due. And it is unjust in any to accept it, who is not truly intitled to receive it.

ALL Obstacles to making a *Dedication* to You, MY FRIENDS and FELLOW CITIZENS, are quite removed, by the many eminent *Virtues*, you have lately



shewn in public Life. And the many Marks of your Favor and Beneficence, conferred on me, which I shall ever retain deeply ingraven on the Table of mine Heart; bind me down, by every Principle of Morality and true Religion, by every Regard to true public, or private Interest, or Duty, to serve you, with all the Powers that Providence has, or shall give me. And now permit me to take this Opportunity of assuring you, which I do from my Soul, in the utmost Solemnity, that while you dare pay the same Regard to VIRTUE, contend for your LIBERTY, and labor to promote true LOYALTY, with the same Steadiness, Zeal, Resolution and Affiduity, which you have of late demonstrated to the World; no Consideration on Earth shall ever induce me to change MASTERS, or shall tire me in your Service, while you continue, what I have hitherto found you, the worthiest and best of Men.

I now, beg Leave to present you, not an *original Writing*, but a *new Edition* of one, that has been long since suppressed, or lost.

IT is a NARRATIVE and ACCOMPT of the *Foundation and Constitution* of the HOSPITAL and FREE-SCHOOL of this City; shewing, the Intention of our Fore-fathers in the Institution, the legal Governors, and their Powers, by an *Abstract* of the *Charter*; the Contributions then made to the *Building* and the *Support* of the House, the Expences, and the Oeconomy laid down.

THIS was published and dispersed among the Benefactors, in the Year 1673, by Order of the *Assembly*, in the Year 1671. And, as it has that Sanction, it must be supposed to have greater Weight and Authority with the Public, than any Thing I could offer of mine own, upon the Occasion.

You will observe, the Intention of the *Founders and Benefactors* of this House, was to let their *Charity begin at Home*; to make a comfortable Provision for the *reduced Citizens* and their *helpless Orphans*, and by separating them from foreign intruding *Vagrants*, by

The Total Sum of the Charge, amounts to the Sum of three thousand five hundred fifty-six Pounds, three Shillings and nine Pence three Farthings; out of which deduct the Total of the Discharge, being three thousand five hundred and fifty-one Pound, fourteen Shillings and eleven Pence, and there remains in Cash, four Pound eight Shillings and ten Pence three Farthings.

It is hoped that this true and plain Narrative here given, will so far both satisfy and excite all those that are piously inclined, as to supersede the Necessity of using any long or elaborate Motives. For none can have so ill an Opinion either of the Work, or of the Reader, as to bring either into Suspicion by plying them with such artificial Arguments and Insinuations, as might perhaps persuade more unwilling Persons to a less useful Work. They are not now persuaded to erect Pyramids, or Mausolæums, or any such ostentatious Vanities of impotent Ambition and superfluous Wealth. And yet if the thirst of Glory, and the fond desire of an empty Name, could prevail with others to lavish out the Treasures of whole Provinces and Kingdoms on such prodigious Piles, as served for no other Use but only to make Men gaze at the Structure and talk of the Founders; certainly then somewhat may be allowed for the public Credit of a Metropolis, especially when what is designed, is not for Shew, but Use; and all the Glory of this Performance is of doing that which may be serviceable to the Common Good.



BUT indeed Houses of this Nature are so frequent in most of the considerable Places of our neighbour Nations, that we cannot hope for any singular Credit to our City by erecting this, but only to wipe away that Blot and Infamy that hath been cast upon us for having none. For in the printed Memoirs of some Foreigners, whom either Business or Curiosity brought to visit these Parts, we have been openly upbraided to the whole World, that though we had several Churches, yet we had not one Hospital. They noted it for a strange unwonted Thing, that in the chief City of a Kingdom, there should not be made some public Provision for the Poor, which the Policy and Interest of other Places always accounted one of the first and greatest Cares. We confess the Observation was very sharply made, and doubt it designed not only to cast a Slur upon our City, but upon our Profession, as if our Religion were devoid of Charity, and our Faith of good Works.

BUT whatsoever Shame may light upon this City, or Kingdom by so long a Delay of so good a Work, yet we think ourselves bound in Zeal and Conscience to vindicate our Religion from so foul a Calumny. For although we disclaim and renounce the Merit, yet we all avow the Necessity of good Works. Though we pretend not to purchase Mansions in Heaven, by building Hospitals on Earth; yet we own it our indispensable Duty to make such Friends of the Mammon of Unrighteousness, that, when we fail, we may be received into those everlasting Habitations.

THIS House is not intended to be an Hive for Drones, but a profitable Nursery for the Commonwealth, to breed up Youth in Virtue and Knowledge, till they shall be of sufficient Growth to be transplanted, some to honest Trades and Occupations; and some that are more remarkably pregnant, to the University. It is not unknown what singular Advantages other Cities have reaped by this wise management of their Charity. For by this Course they have many times raked Jewels out of Rubbish, and taken Persons off

**I**T hath ever been observed that, in great and populous places, the two different Extrems of Opulency and Penury do usually meet; some enjoying abundance to superfluity, while others labour under want, to excess of misery. That Statue which *Nebuchadnezzar* saw in his dream, might very fitly represent not only Monarchies, but Cities; wherein the upper parts are of Silver and Gold, but the feet of miry Clay and Iron. And as, where the richest and most precious Mines are found; there, the ground about them is most Barren and Hungry; So it is commonly seen that in those very places where the Veins of Wealth are opened, and pour their Stores into some Men's Bosoms, there likewise Want and Poverty do most imperiously reign over a great part of the Neighbourhood.

WHICH diversity of Mens conditions, as it may be rationally ascribed to several causes, both natural, and moral; so especially to the Wisdom of Divine Providence, which brings both the Rich and the Poor to meet together, that both might be mutually benefited: The Poor supplied by the Rich Man's Wealth, and the Rich helped by the Services and Prayers of the Poor. And happy is that City where this Inequality of Estate, is thus equally and piously managed; where private, or especially public, Charity relieves the aged and *helpless Poor*; and the necessary Charity of severe laws, and a due Execution of them, keeps others from being *criminally poor*.

THE



THE want of a strict care, and regulation herein, hath filled many great Cities with troublesome swarms of idle Vagrants; whose impudent and importune Clamours, are *Assaults* rather than *Requests*, and tend not more to the *Molestation*, than to the *Shame* and *Reproach*, of the Inhabitants. For whilst, either a foolish and harmful commiseration, or a supine neglect of this concern, hath in effect exaundered the Laws made against them; this sort of People hath been, as the *Historian* speaks of the *Astrologers* in *Rome*, always *forbidden*, yet *still retained*.

It is not our Purpose to make Reflections upon others, nor yet to excuse our selves, by pleading that this Evil is general. Possibly our own City is more infested than any other. We would willingly sweep our own Streets from that Canaille of loose and sturdy Vagabonds, whose Tongues cry much louder than their Wants. It hath doubtless been observed not only by our selves, but by others who have resorted hither, how in every Corner they way-lay and invade Men's Charity.

*Hereupon have insued two grand Mischiefs,*

THE one, that the Charity of well disposed Persons is hereby drained away from the proper Objects of it, whose real Wants are usually accompanied with Humility and Modesty; and, by an inevitable mistake, the greatest share of it drops into the hands of a Rout of lewd Wretches, who afterwards laugh at that pity, which their Tones and Cantings have moved.

THE other, that Charity being thus frequently misplaced, hath at last grown weary of it's Mistakes; and not well knowing how to distinguish between those to whom Bounty, and to whom Correction, would be proper Alms, hath utterly hardened it self against all those Shapes and Semblances of Misery, which have so often abused it.

In the year 1668, the right honourable the Earl of *Offory*, being then Lord Deputy of this Kingdom, and the Lords of his Majesty's most honourable Privy Council, taking into their serious Consideration the great Inconveniencies caused by such dissolute People, were pleased  
out



out of their pious and prudent Care for the Welfare of this City, to direct a letter to the Lord Mayor, requiring a speedy and effectual Redress of these Disorders.

IT is with all Thankfulness acknowledged, that this Letter was it which laid the first Stone in this great and good Design; and ever adored be the gracious Providence of God, that moved our Governors to this pious care, and the City to follow the intimations of their, and the Divine, Pleasure.

THIS Letter, being of such public Concern, was, with the first Opportunity, communicated by the then Lord Mayor to the Common Council of the City; who unanimously resolved to endeavour that full Satisfaction, and due Obedience might be given to the whole Contents of it. Whereupon they streight proceeded to issue out Orders against all vagrant and dissolute Beggars, and executed them upon as many of that note as could be deprehended.

BUT this course not altogether obtaining it's desired Effect, partly by reason of the huge numbers of indigent Persons; and partly because of the great Difficulty of discerning between *the impotent* and the *impudent*; the pretences of the latter being as plausible, and their complaints as passionate, as the other; lest therefore too much Lenity should be exercised towards those, whose idleness deserved Rigour, or too much Rigour towards those, whose Wants required Pity and Relief; it was judged the most rational and expedient Method, by a particular and exact Inquiry, to select out such as were fit Objects for Charity, that these being separated from the rest, Magistrates might strictly execute the Laws, without being accounted either unjust, or uncharitable.

IN pursuance hereof, it was by the free and general vote of all the said Assembly enacted, that an Hospital should forthwith be endeavoured to be founded on *Oxmantown Green*, one of the most pleasant, convenient, and healthful places belonging unto this City: And that it should be built large enough for the Reception



ception, and indowed liberally enough for the Maintenance of as many Poor, as should be thought worthy to be entertained on the public Charity.

AND that there might be no delays in a work of so great Necessity and Importance, Treasurers, or Trustees, were then appointed, to whose care the Management of this Affair was committed; and who were requested and impowered to receive the charitable Contributions of all Persons, whose Hearts God should incline to the promoting so good a work, and to expend what was so received, as should be judged most behoveful for the Ends above mentioned.

ACCORDING to the Resolution thus taken and declared; on the eighth day of *May* in the year of our LORD 1669, this work was begun, though it's Beginners were much better furnished with Alacrity and Willingness, than with Ability and Means, to go through with so great an Undertaking.

BUT yet, that they may not be branded with the Imputation of Folly in beginning to Build, and not having where withal to finish it, there Apology is, that they did confidently believe, what the Event hath in a good Measure verified; that they had a large and rich Stock lying in the hands of many Charitable Persons in this Kingdom, part of which hath been already received, and employed; as at the end of this Narrative will appear, and they do with the same humble Confidence expect those greater Supplies which yet are wanting, beseeching the great and universal BENEFAC-TOR, that he would be pleased to excite a pious Emulation in Men's Hearts, and make them contend in this good work, whose Name shall be most blessed on Earth, and whose Reward most glorious in Heaven.

AND this hope is the more increased by observing how God hath *hitherto* signally owned and favoured that good Intention, and by bringing in seasonable Supplies, when they were most needed, and least expected, hath given just Cause to intitle him to the Work; and with all humble Praise to acknowledge, that HE him-  
self



worthy of so high a Cognizance, yet his Majesty respecting rather the Piety of their Intentions, than the Grandeur of the Work it self, was graciously pleased, as an honourary Addition to his Royal Grant, to give a Name to this Issue of public Charity; commanding it henceforth to be called, THE HOSPITAL AND FREE-SCHOOL OF KING CHARLES THE SECOND, DUBLIN. A Name from which all good Men, draw all good Omens: And may it ever Flourish, and Triumph over Time and Chance.

AND because it may prove expedient not only for the Information, but also for the Encouragement, of the pious Reader to further Contributions, to understand the true design of his Charity, and the security of it's Continuance as a lasting Monument that may recommend his Memory to future Ages; it is conceived convenient to subjoin an Extract of the Charter it self, omitting the Circumlocutions of the Legal Form, which might swell this Narrative to an unnecessary Tedioufness.

“ His Majesty therefore has therein granted, to  
 “ the *Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens* of the  
 “ City of *Dublin*, and their *Succeffors for Ever*,  
 “ all that Piece and Parcel of Ground in Oxmantown-  
 “ Green near the said City, where the intended Hos-  
 “ pital and School is already Built, to be held of his  
 “ Majesty, as of his Castle of *Dublin*, in free and  
 “ common Soccage, as a Mansion-House, and Place  
 “ of Abode, for the Sustainment and Relief of Poor  
 “ Children, Aged, Maimed and Impotent People,  
 “ Inhabiting or Residing in the said City of *Dublin*;  
 “ and giving Power to the said *Mayor, Sheriffs, &c.*  
 “ and their *Succeffors* forever, at their Wills and Plea-  
 “ sures, to place therein such Master or Masters, and  
 “ such Numbers of Poor People and Children, and  
 “ such Officers and Ministers of the said Hospital  
 “ and Free-School, as likewise an able, learned,  
 “ Pious and Orthodox Minister, to be approved of  
 “ by the Arch-Bishop of *Dublin* for the time being,  
 “ which Minister, is to read Divine Service, and  
 “ Preach,



“ Preach, to such as shall Reside there, and Cate-  
 “ chize such Children as shall be in the said *Hospital*  
 “ or *Free-School*, as to the said *Mayor*, &c. shall seem  
 “ convenient. Who are also thereby impowered to  
 “ remove such Master, Minister, &c. Or any other  
 “ Officers belonging to the said *Hospital*, and to  
 “ place others in their Stead, and to appoint Fees  
 “ and Sallaries for all the aforementioned Members  
 “ of the *Hospital* and *Free-School*, as they and their  
 “ Successors shall think fit; that the *Mayor*, &c. and  
 “ their Successors be GOVERNORS of the said *Hospital*  
 “ and *Free School*, and of the Lands and Tenements,  
 “ &c. to the same belonging; that under this Title  
 “ of the GOVERNORS of the HOSPITAL AND FREE-  
 “ SCHOOL OF KING CHARLES THE SECOND,  
 “ DUBLIN, they be a Body Corporate and capable  
 “ of Suing, or being Sued in any of his Majesty’s  
 “ Courts, and of purchasing to the Yearly Value of  
 “ 6000 *l. ster.* and of keeping a Seal, &c. And they  
 “ are hindered from Alienating any of the Estate of  
 “ the said *Hospital* and *Free School* to any other use  
 “ than that of the Corporation now mentioned; and  
 “ from making Leases for above 41 Years of Houses,  
 “ or other Buildings, or 21 of Lands Tenements;  
 “ &c. And that either in Possession, or not above  
 “ two Years before the Expiration of the Estate in  
 “ Possession, and without any Fine or Income, at the  
 “ best Yearly Rent that *Bonâ Fide* from good and  
 “ solvent Tenants may be had. Nor is any Lease  
 “ to be made to any of the GOVERNORS, or any other  
 “ Person to the use of, or in trust for any of them.  
 “ They have also power given them of making Rules  
 “ and Statutes, &c. For the Government of the  
 “ *Hospital* and *Free-School*, and to Execute, or Abro-  
 “ gate such Rules as they find Occasion, provided  
 “ they be not contrary to the Laws in force, or the  
 “ Royal Authority.”

AND now that this true and faithful Narrative of  
 the Progress of this good Work has been given, it  
 has been thought needful here to subjoin a perfect Ca-  
 talogue



talogue of those Benefactors whom God hath stirred up to Contribute to it ; together with a just Accompt of every particular Sum received and disbursed ; which it is hoped will not be expounded as performed with a design of bringing Men's Charity into a Comparifon ; which were both odious, and difingenuous ; but partly to declare to all the World the Faithfulness and Integrity of the Management of this great Trust ; and partly alfo that the Prudent and Charitable Reader may be able to eftimate how much is yet wanting to the competent Furniture and Indowment of this Foundation, and by the Examples of fo many worthy Perfons, may be excited to Register his Name among them, and receive his Reward with them, when God, who hath paffed his Word for their Security, fhall repay this Loan with abundant Interelt and Advantage.

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The Total Sum of the Charge, amounts to the Sum of three thousand five hundred fifty-six Pounds, three Shillings and nine Pence three Farthings; out of which deduct the Total of the Discharge, being three thousand five hundred and fifty-one Pound, fourteen Shillings and eleven Pence, and there remains in Cash, four Pound eight Shillings and ten Pence three Farthings.

It is hoped that this true and plain Narrative here given, will so far both satisfy and excite all those that are piously inclined, as to supersede the Necessity of using any long or elaborate Motives. For none can have so ill an Opinion either of the Work, or of the Reader, as to bring either into Suspicion by plying them with such artificial Arguments and Insinuations, as might perhaps persuade more unwilling Persons to a less useful Work. They are not now persuaded to erect Pyramids, or Mausolæums, or any such ostentatious Vanities of impotent Ambition and superfluous Wealth. And yet if the thirst of Glory, and the fond desire of an empty Name, could prevail with others to lavish out the Treasures of whole Provinces and Kingdoms on such prodigious Piles, as served for no other Use but only to make Men gaze at the Structure and talk of the Founders; certainly then somewhat may be allowed for the public Credit of a Metropolis, especially when what is designed, is not for Shew, but Use; and all the Glory of this Performance is of doing that which may be serviceable to the Common Good.



Benefit of the *Toll* of all the *Bear* and *Barley*, that belong to the *Hospital*, upon his own *Terms*? As I have not *Recourse* to the *Hospital Books*, I can not, at present, set forth the *Contract* exactly. But, is not his making a *Contract* for this *Toll*, as much against the *Intention* of the *Precept* in the *Charter*, as his being a *Tenant*?

CAN the *Hospital* grow *Rich*, under such an *Administration*? Or can the *Citizens*, or their *Orphans* hope to be provided for by *Men*, who are laboring for *Self-Interest*, not for the *Public-Weal*? Or can they hope for any *Regard* from *Strangers*, from *Foreigners*?

Is it not time to discharge these *perfidious Trustees*, these *usurping Governors*? The *Means* are now in your own *Hands*. You may be *FREE*, if you *will*. And I am persuaded you *will*. You have been sufficiently discouraged from suing for *Redress* of *Grievances* in the *Courts of Law*, by the *Fate* of your *Application* for the *Restoration* of the *Election* of *Aldermen*. Can you expect better *Success* against the present *Board of Governors* of the *Blue-Coat Hospital*. See if you can find out who are *Governors*, besides the *Lord Mayor*, and *Aldermen* and their *Creatures*; and judge if there be any *Chance* to set *Matters* to *Right*, by a *Law-Suit*.--If you should discover, that you have too powerful *Men* to contend with, at that *Board*, as well, as at the *Board of Aldermen*, you can only hope for *Redress* in *Parlement*. That you may be able in *spight* to all your *secret* and *avowed Enemies* to elect fit *Representatives* to serve your selves and the *Nation*, in that most august *Assembly*, is the *Purport* of the *Labors*, and the full *Scope* of the most ardent *Wishes* of,

self is the Founder and Builder of this House, designed for the Support and Maintenance of his own Family.

AND as a special remark of the Divine Approbation, it must here likewise with all thankfulness be observed, that although the Stock were always vastly disproportionable to the Greatness of the Undertaking and hath oftentimes been exhausted to the last Mite that it could yield, and no means appeared how more might be procured either to furnish Materials for the Building, or Payment for the Workman for his just and agreed hire ; Yet the Divine Providence hath sent in frequent Supplies, the Charity of some beginning, where others left, and upon Faileur it was furthered by the Forbearance of Persons concerned for Work and Materials, who were confident so good a Design could not want Favourites, till Stone by Stone, this great Work was at length brought to that Perfection wherein now it is.

THE Fabrick consists of three Isles, or Rows of Building meeting in one Front. In the whole it contains very many Apartments ; the greatest Number of which are designed for Lodgings, and may without Annoyance or Incumbrance receive 250, or 300 Persons, the rest is taken up in necessary Offices for the Accommodation of such as shall be admitted, besides the Common-Hall, large and spacious, wherein they are all, with Modesty and Thanksgiving, to take their allowed Repast ; and a fair decent Chappel wherein they are all daily to meet at their stated Hours, to worship God, and to celebrate his Praise, whose Bounty hath rescued them from the Dregs of Misery, and put them into a Condition, though, not splendid and redundant, yet, both sedate and sufficient.

THERE are also four large School-Rooms erected in several parts of the Edifice, for the Instruction of those Children and Youths that shall be entertained, in several sorts of Learning according to their Genius and Capacity, viz. One for the perfect



AND now the great and good God prosper this Work according to the sincerity and uprightness of our Intentions, and so open the Hearts and Hands of those, towards whom his Bounty should be an enforcing Argument for theirs; that this Work, which hath been happily begun by his Mercy, may be happily finished and perfected to his Glory.

the Dunghill, who have afterwards approved themselves fit to sit among Princes. Instances are not rare to be given of those who now wear the Badge of Honour and Authority, that have formerly worn the Badge of public Charity; and are very worthy and beneficial Members of those Places, of which they were once the Eleemosynaries. However, it is very seldom seen that those who have been educated in such Foundations, and disposed of according to the Prudence of their Governors, do utterly miscarry; but at least they attain unto such a Condition wherein they may subsist comfortably, and be reputed honest and serviceable Citizens.

As for aged Persons, although we profess that we are somewhat loth to have this our Nursery incumbered with too many old Trees; yet so many of them as shall be judged meet Objects of Charity, and in any Degree fit for the Service of the House, especially if recommended by any bountiful Benefactor, we shall willingly receive. Still declaring that the Intention of this Work, is not only for a personal Relief, but for the common and public Good; to the promoting of which we think the Support and Education of the younger sort of most conducive.

AND we finally declare, that in proportion to the Sum which it shall please any Benefactor to contribute, so we shall endeavour that he, and his Descendants for ever, shall have Power to nominate and present to the Governors for the time being, one or more poor Children, which, if they be found capable, according to the Rules of this Foundation, shall in no wise be refused, but immediately received in, to enjoy their Share of the common Charity. This we think but a just Acknowledgement of their Bounty. And for ascertaining them hereof, we expect shortly, that some Orders and Statutes shall be established for the better regulating of this House, wherein this shall be enjoined to be inviolably observed.
