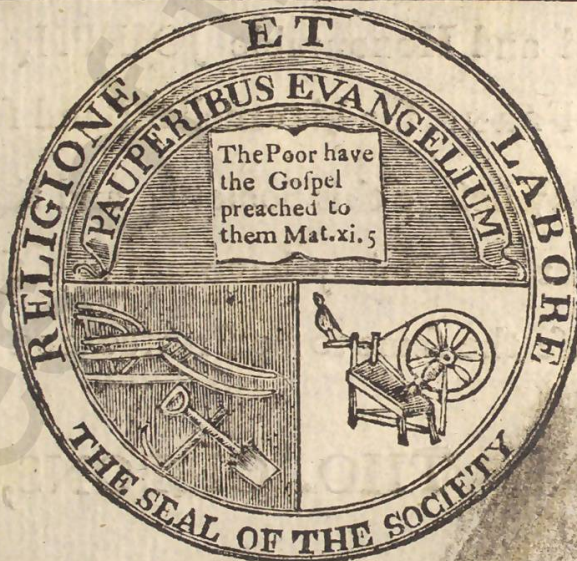

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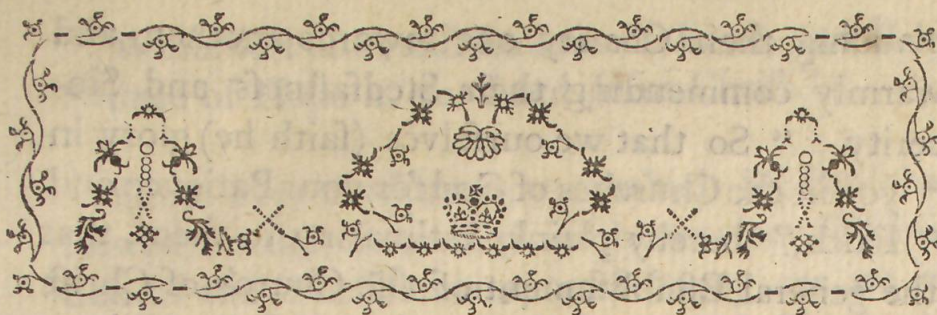

II. THESSALIONS,

CHAP. I. VERSE III.

WE ARE BOUND TO THANK GOD ALWAYS FOR YOU, BRETHREN, AS IT IS MEET, BECAUSE THAT YOUR FAITH GROWETH EXCEEDINGLY, AND THE CHARITY OF EVERY ONE OF YOU ALL TOWARDS EACH OTHER ABUNDETH.

THE general Design of the Apostle in this Epistle was to confirm the Thessalonians in the Profession of their Faith, and to encourage them to persevere in the Pursuit of this great Object, approving their Advancement towards a general Conversion to the Truths of the Gospel, applauding

plauding their Charity one towards another, and warmly commending their Stedfastness and Sincerity. “ So that we ourselves (saith he) glory in “ you in the Churches of God for your Patience and “ Faith,” hereby plainly intimating to them, that the general Establishment of the Church of Christ must be a Work of Labour and the Effect of Time, that many violent Opposers would start up against it, that it would require all their Patience to see, and to bear with the slow Progress of the Gospel, and also the most unshaken Faith to persevere in the Profession of Christianity, notwithstanding the many Discouragements and Obstructions they should meet with.

AND it is observable, that the christian Converts, to whom the Apostle addresseth himself in the Text, were no less remarkable for their Stedfastness and Faith than for their mutual Love and Affection one towards another, as appears from several Passages in this Epistle, where the inspired Author, after indulging the secret Exultations of his Heart in pouring forth Praises to God for their Conversion from Idolatry, takes Occasion to speak in the highest Commendation of their charitable and benevolent Disposition towards each other, “ remembring without ceasing (saith he) your
“ Work

“ Work of Faith, and Labour of Love, and Patience of Hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.”

SUCH were the Encomiums which St. Paul bestowed on the charitable and benevolent Disposition of the Theſſalonians, and happy are we at this Day, that we can with ſo much Juſtice apply the Words of the Apoſtle in the Text to the Patrons and generous Benefactors of this Society, and ſay that we are bound to thank God always for you, Brethren, as it is meet, becauſe that your Faith groweth exceedingly, and the Charity of every one of you all towards each other aboundeth.

THE nature of this Society, which we are now particularly to recommend to your Protection, has been ſo often and ſo fully explained, that it will be unneceſſary for me to enlarge much upon that Head, however it may not be improper to obſerve, that it is an Inſtitution founded on the true and genuine Principles of Chriſtianity, calculated to inform the ignorant, and to relieve the diſtreſſed, and by promoting Induſtry and true Religion among our Countrymen, to provide, (as much as in us lies) both for their temporal and eternal Welfare.

ONE of the greatest Disadvantages which this Country has laboured under, is the blind and devoted Zeal of the lower Class of People to the popish Religion, from which few Attempts have been made to rescue them, with any Success, till the Institution of this Society. Early Prejudices of any Kind, especially those of a religious Nature, are not easily removed, but the difficulty becomes still greater when such Prejudices are imposed at the arbitrary Will of another, and contracted by Ignorant and uninformed Minds, without even being allowed to judge for themselves, and from whom the Principles of true Religion are carefully concealed, nay, who are absolutely forbid to consult the Scriptures, by those who should be the first to instruct them in those sacred Oracles of Truth, and who, being thus kept in Darkness, are for ever deprived of the glorious Light of the Gospel.

SUCH is the State of the poorer Sort of Roman Catholicks of this Kingdom. To remedy this Evil, and to remove those Prejudices, are the chief Ends of the Protestant Charter Schools, for the Success of which, we are met this Day to implore the divine Assistance, to excite the Benevolence of the rich, and the Charity of all to contribute their Support to an Institution, which, by their liberal and generous Benefactions, has already made such considerable

considerable Advancement towards the End proposed, and which in its Completion evidently tends to the general Establishment of the Protestant Religion.

IN the Days of the Reformation, when those bold Assertors of religious Liberty, stood forth in Defence of the great Truths of the Gospel, and with unremitting Assiduity and undaunted Zeal discovered all the Artifices and exposed all the Errors of the Church of Rome, This Kingdom from Circumstances peculiar to its Situation was deprived of those Benefits which were enjoyed by almost every other Country in Europe. Several States on the Continent had the Advantage of hearing the first Reformers, Men no less remarkable for the Purity of their Lives, than for their Learning, and Knowledge of the Scriptures. Many Circumstances concurred about that Time to open Mens Eyes, and lead them to detect the absurd Impositions of the Church of Rome.

THE violent Schism which happened in the Church not long before this great Æra, from its Continuance, and in its Consequences, contributed not a little to forward the great Work of the Reformation, when two or three Pontiffs were at

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the same Time wandering about Europe, entreating the Assistance of every little petty Prince to support their Pretensions to the papal Chair, and by these mean Solicitations, not only exposed their Persons to Ridicule, but brought their Office into Contempt. The People, who were always appealed to in those Contentions, and who were taught before to consider the Infallibility of the Pope as one of the principal Articles of their Religion, began now not only to suspect their Pretensions to this extraordinary Privilege, when they heard them excommunicating their Rivals, with the severest Acrimony, and loading their Adherents with the heaviest ecclesiastical Censures, but they also began to think they had some Right to exercise their own Judgment, or at least to Determine which of these infallible Guides they would chuse to follow.

THE Art of Printing which had been discovered sometime before, enabled the Reformers with greater Facility to extend their Doctrine to the Neighbouring Countries; by this means, many, who by the artful Policy of the Church of Rome, were before held in the darkest Ignorance with Regard to religious Matters, were now enabled to consult their own Reason, and to compare the absurd and extravagant Traditions of the Romish Church,

Church, with the holy Scriptures themselves, the only unerring Standard of all religious Truths.

SUCH advantageous Lights as these could not fail to lead those who paid any serious Attention to them into the Right Path; Doctrines supported by such Evidence soon found their Way into distant Countries, and notwithstanding that civil and ecclesiastical Power were combined against them, gained Ground almost in every Part of Europe.

IT is not here intended to enumerate the various Circumstances which concurred in favouring the great Work of the Reformation, which happily rescued these Kingdoms from the Papal Yoke, and produced such a general Revolution in the Sentiments of Mankind, the greatest as well as the most beneficial that has happened since our blessed Saviour first published his Doctrine in the World. To trace the Causes of this great Event to its original Source, and to consider the various Opinions concerning it, would take up too much Time, nor is it immediately applicable to the present Purpose, nothing farther is intended on this Head at present, than to offer a few Reasons, and in some Measure to account for the slow Growth of the

the Reformation in this Country, whilst it made such a rapid Progress in other Parts of the World.

1st. THE remote Situation of this Kingdom prevented the Inhabitants from hearing the first Reformers, or their immediate Followers, so that whilst the Light of the Reformation shone with conspicuous Lustre in many other Parts, hardly a Gleam of it reached this Country.

AGAIN, their several Publications in different Languages enforcing their Doctrine with the strongest Arguments, and explaining the true Meaning of the holy Scriptures, were eagerly read by all those around them, from which the Inhabitants of this Kingdom could reap no Advantage, being at that Time warmly engaged in civil Contentions among themselves, and of Course not much disposed to attend to religious Disputes, besides having little Intercourse with any other Nation, they were scarce acquainted with any other Language but their own. Add to this, the troublesome Times which followed, and the Rebellions which were fomented here by our natural Enemies, which served but to confirm ancient Prejudices among those who continued of the Popish Religion, and render them callous to all Conviction, but blessed be God, the true Faith was at length planted amongst us,
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it hath taken deep Root and spread its Branches wide, and will, I trust, in God's good Time, cover all the Land.

It is unnecessary before my present Hearers to mention the many Struggles that continued, for more than a Century, between the Supporters of the Protestant Cause and its avowed Enemies, till at last our civil and religious Liberties were settled at the Revolution, upon the firmest Foundation, by that illustrious Prince whom God (in his Mercy to those Kingdoms) thought fit to make the Instrument of his Glory, by establishing the Protestant Religion amongst us, and whose Memory will ever be held dear by every Protestant in this Kingdom, for having reduced it to the Obedience of the Laws, restored us to our Possessions, and settled the Constitution both in Church and State.

For tho' the Protestant Religion was planted long before in Ireland, yet was it so often disturbed, and sometimes near overturned by the insidious Arts and restless Spirit of Popery, that we can hardly place the real Settlement of it, or the Establishment of English Government here at an earlier date. Since that Period it has continued to flourish, Rebellion was extinguished, Arts and Manufactures were improved, Commerce spread her Sails,

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and the Nation soon arrived to a Degree of Wealth and Importance it had not known before. Many of the first Rank and Fortune, having now Time to reflect, seeing the Superiority of a pure Religion, and influenced, I trust, more by Principle than by Interest, conformed to the established Church. Others of inferior Station have followed their Example, what now remains, in order that we should avail ourselves of all the Advantages of the Revolution, but that we endeavour to open the Eyes of the lower Class of People, too many of whom are still kept in the grossest Ignorance by their popish Priests, and enslaved to the most abject Superstition? and what more effectual Method can be taken for this Purpose than the Mode adopted by this Society? or what means more agreeable to the true Spirit of the Christian Religion? no Force or Compulsion is used, no pious Frauds are practised, or malicious Persecution.

BUT as it has been found next to an Impossibility to root out the inveterate Prejudices of such as have been already bred up in Ignorance and Superstition; the Care and Attention of this Society, following the Example of the wisest States, have been entirely directed to the rising Generation. The Children of popish Parents (who are not well able to maintain their numerous Progeny, much less to give

such other Arts as their Years and Dispositions seem best adapted to; every Motive to Industry is carefully inculcated, that their Hands may be ready to labour, for, as the wise Man saith, "In all Labour there is Profit." Thus prepared by the Society (as they advance in Years) they are apprenticed out to different Trades, with the fairest Prospect of becoming good Protestants, loyal Subjects, and useful Members of Community.

It might be thought that Parents who had such strong Objections to the established Church, would not commit the Care and Education of their Children into Protestant Hands, but from Experience it is found far otherwise; tho' such Parents cannot conquer their old Prejudices, and are unwilling themselves (perhaps through a false Shame) to quit their former Connections; yet have they most cheerfully entrusted their infant Offspring into the fostering Hands of this Society; nor can there be a stronger Argument in Favour of this Institution, than the Papists themselves conceiving so high an Opinion of it; should we not therefore exert every Power, and strain every Nerve, to encourage and promote this favourable Disposition towards us? that we may win them over to us by Love, and bind them to us by every Tie of Gratitude and Interest.

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THE present State of the Funds of this Society, however, calls upon me particularly to recommend them now to your Protection; which although they have been managed with the utmost Frugality, yet they have been found insufficient to carry this useful Work to that Extent, which the Nature of it deserves, or, of late, even to support what has been already undertaken, with Vigour and Effect. How to account for this Defalcation is not an easy Matter; the Wealth and Opulence of this Country were never at an higher Pitch; the Sources of Charity never more open, Generosity and Hospitality, the distinguishing Characteristics of this Nation, never more unbounded: but perhaps the Stream, which was confined to one Channel, is now directed into many; other Charities have sprung up, for which large Contributions have been raised, and which, I doubt not, are converted to very useful Purposes, and far be it from me, as it is far from the Duty of this Place, to set Bounds to the charitable Disposition of any. It is however but too plain to observe, that all the Good we vain would do, we are not able to accomplish; should we not then, in an especial Manner, turn our Thoughts and contribute every Aid in our Power to this charitable Institution? as I think I may with safety affirm, that none other has yet been found out of more national Advantage,
or

or more general Utility, than the Protestant Charter Schools of this Kingdom.

BUT while we regret our Inability to carry this Scheme to a greater extent, let us acknowledge with Gratitude the noble and generous Benefactions which have already enabled the Society to do so much Good. His late Majesty very early distinguished it as an Object well worthy his royal Patronage, and contributed very largely to its Support, and our present gracious Sovereign, who has ever shewn a paternal Regard for his faithful Subjects of Ireland, has continued his royal Bounty to the Society with the strongest Marks of Approbation; the Legislature of this Kingdom convinced of the great Advantages that result from it, have wisely taken it under their Protection; many Individuals of Great Britain (in the Infancy of the Society) remitted large Sums for the Benefit of this Charity, for which they could not expect to receive any temporal Advantage. God grant they may have their Reward.

NOR let us forget to mention with Thanks the many Donations that have been received by the Society from People of the first Rank and others of this Kingdom, though less it is to be feared in Proportion to the Advantages they must derive from
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the Success of it. Every Motive of Religion, of Interest, and sound Policy, combine to induce us of this Kingdom to promote this Work, upon which not only depends the Advancement of our Faith, but also the Improvement of our Properties, and the Security of the State; every Diminution of this Fund must be considered as a national Loss, and every Obstruction to this Scheme, a national Injury.

AND here we cannot avoid making one melancholy Observation, the Truth of which too evidently appears, the Effects of which are too sensibly felt by the Kingdom in general, and particularly by this Society. It is a Misfortune peculiar to this Land, that so many Noblemen and others of large Fortunes in Ireland do not reside in the Kingdom; which (besides the Loss of these Benefits that would necessarily arise from their immediate Care and Inspection) occasions a perpetual Drain of the Wealth and Substance of this Country. Upon a Calculation made sometime ago on this Head it appeared, that a Sum not less than a Million and a half annually was drawn out of this Kingdom, a Circumstance not to be equalled, perhaps, in the History of any other Country in the World, nor is it easy to conceive how a Nation can

can well subsist under such Disadvantages; and this too, by many who derive their Honours and sole Property out of this Kingdom. Some indeed there are who, having also large Property and being in high Station in another Country, we cannot expect to reside among us, but upon a proper Representation being made, by the Governors of the respective Counties, or the Bishops in each Diocese, of the general Utility, and of the present Necessities of the Society to such Noblemen and others of great Fortune in this Kingdom who do not reside here, I am persuaded they would be induced from the most liberal Motives to contribute some small Proportion of that Income, which they enjoy from the immediate Produce of this Country, and from the Labour and Industry of its Inhabitants, towards the Support and Advancement of a Scheme which will not only promote their own Interest, but also redound much to their Honour.

A Work of this Nature and of this Extent must naturally be slow in its Progress, and gradual in its Operation; however from a slight View of the Conduct and Management of the Society, it is evident that the Public have already derived great Advantages, and the Protestant Interest acquired great Strength from this Institution. It appears that there are Two Thousand Children actually maintained

tained and instructed in the Schools at the same Time, and above Four Hundred Infants received and supported in the several Nurseries, many of these relieved from absolute Want, and all of them (a very few excepted) rescued from the Errors of Popery and Superstition, and if perchance in their former Situation they had escaped the Hazards of their infant State, yet from the necessitous Condition of their Parents, who were unable to give them any Education, they were still exposed to Idleness and Vice; whereas they are now prepared to become useful Members of Society.

SINCE the Opening of this Institution there have been Four Thousand Six Hundred Children, and upwards, apprenticed out to Protestant Masters and Mistresses, which as they settle in the World, allowing only an Increase of three to a Family, amounts to Fourteen Thousand within the Space of Forty-two Years, and as this Number will accumulate every Day, what an Acquisition must this prove to the Protestant Interest of this Kingdom, and how anxious should we be to support and forward the laudable Endeavours of this Society which so manifestly tend to promote the Interest of every Individual, and to secure the Happiness and Welfare of the Community.

THE greatest Difficulties are now surmounted, and almost every Objection removed; and may we not expect, if we persevere, that God, who is rich in Mercy, and abundant in Goodness, will perfect the Work which he hath begun in us? which altho' we cannot accomplish To-day or To-morrow, yet let not this slacken our Zeal, for we know "that to every Thing there is a Season, and a Time to every Purpose under Heaven." Let us then implore the Divine Aid to assist our weak Endeavours, and be assured that in due Season we shall reap if we fail not.

AND may the Almighty, who worketh all Things of his good Pleasure, incline the Hearts of the Rich to consider well the Talent committed to their Charge. The Pious and Humane will always be ready to lend their Aid to so important and so beneficial a Charity, which is not confined to any particular Object, but diffuses itself through a whole Nation, and will prove of Service to Generations yet to come. May we all unite, and encourage one another to go on in this good Work, knowing that the End of all our Labours is to promote the Glory of God, and the Good of Mankind.

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God grant that this Faith may still increase in us, and our Charity still abound, and that we may use the good Things of this Life that we may lay up for ourselves Treasures incorruptible, in those blessed Habitations, which are prepared for the Righteous in the Kingdom of Heaven.

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A B S T R A C T

O F

HIS MAJESTY'S ROYAL CHARTER,

For Erecting and Promoting *English* Protestant Schools, in
I R E L A N D.

GEORGE the Second, by the Grace of God, of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c.——
To all Persons to whom these Presents shall come.——Forasmuch as we have received Information by the Petition of the Lord Primate, Lord Chancellor, Archbishops, Noblemen, Bishops, Judges, Gentry, and Clergy of our Kingdom of Ireland, that in many Parts of the said Kingdom, there are great Tracts of Land almost intirely inhabited by Papists, who are kept by their Clergy in great Ignorance of the true Religion, and bred up in great Disaffection to the Government: That the erecting of ENGLISH PROTESTANT SCHOOLS in those Places, is absolutely necessary for their Conversion; that the ENGLISH PARISH SCHOOLS, already established, are not sufficient for that Purpose; nor can the Residence of the Parochial Clergy only, fully answer that End.

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To the Intent therefore that the Children of the Popish, and other poor Natives of the said Kingdom, may be instructed in the English Tongue, and the Principles of true Religion and Loyalty, and that so good a Design may the more effectually be carried on; the Lord Lieutenant, and some of the chief Nobility, Gentry, and Clergy of the said Kingdom, are appointed Commissioners to execute the Purposes of this Charter, and have a Power to elect others in the Room of their deceased Members; and are constituted a Corporation or Body Politic by the Name of the INCORPORATED SOCIETY in Dublin, for promoting English PROTESTANT SCHOOLS in Ireland: And are capable to receive and enjoy in Fee, and in Perpetuity, any Manors, Lands, Tenements, &c. the same not exceeding the Value of Two Thousand Pounds per Annum, and any Sum or Sums of Money, that shall be given them by any Person or Persons, Bodies Politic and Corporate, &c. to be applied for the Establishing and Supporting ENGLISH PROTESTANT SCHOOLS, in such Places of the Kingdom as they shall think proper.

THE said Society is impowered to nominate and appoint School-masters and School-mistresses, to be approved and licensed by the Archbishops and Bishops respectively, to continue during the Pleasure of the said Society; who are to be supported by the Society, and provided with all Things necessary for the Instruction of the poor Children in the Principles of the Protestant Religion, Reading, Writing and Arithmetic; as likewise with proper Books and all necessary Materials fit for teaching them Husbandry, Housewifery, Trades, Manufactures, &c. in order to bring them up to Virtue, Labour and Industry.

THE Society is likewise impowered to nominate Persons to receive Subscriptions, Benefactions, &c. in any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, from all well-disposed Persons.—The Society may elect and admit Subscribers (being Protestants) to be Members, to assist in carrying on the Design aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS of the INCORPORATED SOCIETY in Dublin, for
 promoting English Protestant Schools in IRELAND, from the Opening
 of His late MAJESTY'S Royal Charter, February 6, 1733, to Novem-
 ber 1, 1776.

THE Original Design of this Society is well known to have been principally formed by the late Right Reverend Doctor *Henry Maule*, Lord Bishop of *Dromore*, afterwards of *Meath*; which being highly approved and encouraged by the then Lords Justices, and a great Number of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of the Commons, the Clergy, and principal Gentlemen of the Kingdom, His late Majesty, upon their humble Petition, was graciously pleased in 1733, through the favourable Interposition of his Grace the late Duke of *Dorset*, then Lord Lieutenant, to grant His Royal Charter of Incorporation for the Erecting and Supporting of Schools, wherein the Children of Papists and other poor Natives might be instructed in the *English* Tongue, and the Principles of true Religion and Loyalty, and trained up to the Practice of Industry and Labour.

IN Pursuance of which, Charter-Schools have from Time to Time been erected by the Society in several parts of the Kingdom, under the immediate Direction of Local Committees of the principal Gentlemen and Clergy, who are appointed to inspect and examine into the Instruction and Employment of the Children, their Food and State of Health; the Sufficiency and Diligence of the Masters and Mistresses, and all other Particulars relative to the Oeconomy and Management of the Schools and then to report the same to the Society; besides which, the Schools are frequently visited and inspected by the several Members of the Society, as they have Opportunity.

THE Society have the Satisfaction to observe, that their Scheme of dividing the Childrens Time between the Learning necessary for their

future State of Life, and such gentle Work as is suited to their present tender Age, hath been successfully adopted by many Charity-Schools in *Dublin* and other Places; whereby the Benefit of the Institution hath probably been extended far beyond the Expectation of those who at first most warmly promoted it. But there is one Part of their Discipline peculiar to the Society, which is, the transplanting of them into such Schools as are most remote from their Popish Relations. And the more effectually to secure its good Success, they recommend to the several Local Committees, and enjoin the School-masters, by all possible Means, to guard against any Intercourse between the Children, and any of the Priests, or other Popish Inhabitants in the Neighbourhood of the Schools.

THE great Assistances, whereby the Society have from Time to Time been enabled to carry this extensive Design into Execution, have been annually published, not only for the Information of the Public, but in Gratitude to the pious and charitable Benefactors.

HIS late Majesty was graciously pleased in the Year 1739, to honour the Society with His Royal Countenance, by a Donation of One Thousand Pounds, and an annual Grant of the like Sum on the Establishment of this Kingdom. And His present Majesty has likewise been graciously pleased to continue the same Mark of His Royal Favour; which they humbly beg Leave, with the most respectful Duty, thankfully to acknowledge.

The Parliament of *Ireland*, with that laudable Zeal for the Advancement of the Protestant Religion and the Benefit of their Country, by which their Proceedings have ever been distinguished, have also been pleased to take the Society under their Protection, and to grant them the Produce of a Tax on Hawkers and Pedlars, as well as several considerable Sums of Money, to Support the Schools, and to enable them to erect Nurseries for the Reception of Children too young to be admitted into the Schools.

THE Parliament have likewise given an additional and most honourable Testimony of their Confidence in the Society, by vesting in them the Estates granted by *Richard*, late Earl of *Ranelagh*, for the Endowment of Charity-Schools, in the Towns of *Athlone* and *Roscommon*.

THE Contributions of private Persons, both in *Great-Britain*, and *Ireland*, have also been very considerable; as may appear by the annual Account of Subscriptions and Donations received, for the Erection and Endowment of the several Schools. From the Commencement of the Institution to *November 1776*, the Sum of 54,007l. 3s. 6d. hath been remitted by the Corresponding Society in *London*, to whose zealous and most useful Endeavours for promoting this Charitable Institution, as well by communicating their Sentiments and Advice upon all Occasions, as by contributing and procuring Benefactions, the Society are too highly indebted, not to embrace every Opportunity of professing their Obligations, and returning their most hearty Thanks.

A minute Account of the Society's Proceedings, relative to the Suppression of the several Schools of *Killough*, *Kilmallock*, *Newton Eyre*, *Newtown Corry*, *Ballykett*, *Kingfale*, *Armagh*, *Tarbert*, *Ballinahineh* and *Templestown*, mentioned in their former Publications, would be too long to insert in this Abstract, but may be seen in the Society's Books, to which there is Access at all Times, by applying to Mr. *Thomas Gibbons*, Secretary, at the Society's House, N^o 6, *Suffolk-Street*.

THE Society at a General Meeting, agreed to the following Resolutions, relative to the Admission of Children into their Schools and Nurseries, viz.

WHEREAS it has been the constant Practice of this Society, not to admit any Children, but such as are Children of Papists, or at least, where one of their Parents are or have been Papists, or in Case the Parents are dead or they being deserted, are in the Hands of Papists, and thereby are in the utmost Danger of being bred up Papists: And,
whereas

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whereas the Society have some Reason to suspect, that in some Instances some of their Committees have acted contrary thereto, in the Admission of Children.

‘RESOLVED, that the Committee of Fifteen, or the Local Committees of the several Schools and Nurseries, do not admit any Children into their Schools or Nurseries, unless the Children shall appear in the above Circumstances, by proper Certificates or Affidavits, and that the Local Committees do not admit any Children, till upon sending up such Certificates, or Affidavits, to the Society or Committee of Fifteen, they shall approve of their Admission.’

ORDERED, that the above Resolution be immediately sent to the several Local Committees belonging to this Society, in Order, that they may conform thereto.

N. B. The Additional Endowments made to several of the Schools in Consequence of the Society's Application to the Founders for further Aid, appear in the particular Account of each School, in turned Comma's.

And in all the Schools belonging to the INCORPORATED SOCIETY, besides the Duties of Religion, Reading and Writing, the Boys are employed in Works of Husbandry, Gardening, &c. and the Girls in the Business of the House and Dairy, Spinning, Knitting, Sewing, &c.

N^o I. ARDBRACCAN, County of MEATH.

THIS School, wherein are Fifty Children, was endowed by the Right Rev. Dr. Maule, former Lord Bishop of Meath, deceased, with Two Acres of Land, Plantation Measure, Rent-free in Perpetuity, belonging to the See, on Part whereof the School-House is built: His Lordship also granted to the Society a Lease of Eighteen Acres more, contiguous to the same, at 5s. per Acre per Annum, for which he took no Rent during his Incumbency, and always renewed without Fine, and his Lordship gave 20l. and collected 246l. 7s. 6d. towards the Building.

'The Right Reverend and Honourable Dr. Henry Maxwell, Lord Bishop of Meath, upon the Society's Application for further Aid, has been pleased to propose either to grant a Renewal of the present Lease, without Fine, or to grant a new Lease upon such Terms as his Lordship is empowered to do by a Clause in the Act of Parliament, passed in the Eight Year of his present Majesty's Reign, for licensing Hawkers and Pedlars, and for the Encouragement of English Protestant Schools, which latter proposal the Society did agree most thankfully to accept.'

N. B. The Master pays the Society 12s. per Acre for the Lands.

The late Samuel Gerrard of Clangill, in the County of Meath, Esq; bequeathed 40s. per Annum, for Forty Years, towards the Support of this School, besides 5l. per Annum, for the same Term, to the Fund at large, from the 15th of May, 1751, to be paid by Mr. Thomas Gerrard of Liscarton, in the County of Meath.

The Rev. Dr. Monck subscribes 1l. 2s. 9d. per Annum to this School.

N^o VI. CASTLEDERMOT, County of KILDARE.

THIS School, built for the Reception of Forty Boys, was endowed with Twenty Acres of Land, by His Grace the late Duke of Leinster, for 999 Years, from the first Day of May 1748, at a Pepper Corn yearly; the Right Hon. Robert, Earl of Kildare, His Grace's Father, gave the Sum of 500l. in his Life-time, and bequeathed a further Sum of 500l. which have been expended in building and enlarging the School.

N^o VII. CASTLECAULFIELD, County of TYRONE.

THIS School (being ruinous in 1776,) is to be rebuilt on another Site, upon the Lands settled on the Society by Lease, from His Grace the Lord Primate, and the Children for the Present have been transplanted to other Schools, there to abide untill the new School shall be erected: In the mean Time the said Lands being set at a good Rent, the Profits are now set apart as a Fund towards the said Building, which will be farther encouraged by Subscriptions.

The present Incumbent, the Rev. Mr. George Evans hath offered Two Acres of his Glebe, Tythe free, contiguous to the Lands of His Grace the Lord Primate, to be enjoyed by the Society, in Lieu of the One Acre given by the late Incumbent, and to Subscribe 4l. per Annum, towards the Support of the School during his Incumbency. And His Grace, by Virtue of an enabling Clause, in an Act of Parliament passed in this Kingdom, in the 13th and 14th Years of His present Majesty's Reign, hath most generously granted to the Society, a Lease of 30 Irish Acres, Plantation Measure, of His Graces See Lands, for 99 Years, from the 1st of November, 1775, at the low Rent of 4s. 6d. per Acre, per Annum, together with 6 Acres and 26 Perches English Measure of Bog as a farther Endowment which the Society most thankfully have accepted.

N^o VIII. CREGGANE, County of ARMAGH.

THIS School consists of Forty Children, and is endowed with Five Acres of Land, Rent-free in Perpetuity, viz. Two, by the late Rev. Mrs. Elizabeth and Mrs. Judith Colley, Aunts to the said Ladies, built the School at their own Expence.

Mr. Wilson's Will has been complied with.

The Society set apart Thirty-two Acres of the said Lands of Farra for the Use of the School, for which the Master allows Half a Guinea per Acre, but if to be set, they are reported to be worth Eighteen Shillings per Acre.

Mr. Adderly built the School for Forty Children, which the Society have increased to the Number of Fifty, for 420*l.* which was estimated at 800*l.* The Rev. Dr. St. John Browne, Incumbent of the Parish, does not take any Tythes of the School Lands.

N^o XXIII. INNISCARRA, County of CORK.

THE late Sir John Conway Colthurst, Bart. granted to the Society Two Acres of Land, Statute Measure, Rent free in Perpetuity, and set Twenty Acres more for Three Lives, from the 25th of March, 1759, at the yearly Rent of 7*s.* per Acre.

‘ The said Sir John, upon the Society’s Application for further Aid, was pleased to propose upon their surrendering or reconveying to him the said Twenty-two Acres of Land, to grant a new Lease of the same for Three Lives, renewable for ever, without Fine, at the present yearly Rent of 7*l.* during his Life, and after his decease at the yearly Rent of 14*l.* the Society engaging to keep up

up the School to the Number of Forty Children; which Proposal they did resolve was satisfactory, and therefore agreed to accept of the same.

The Society have since increased the Number of Children to Fifty.

Towards founding a School in this Place, the late Reverend Christopher Donnellan, D. D Incumbent of the Parish, bequeathed the Sum of 600l. but by a Deficiency of his personal Assets, the Society received no more than 184l. 3s. 1½d. until after the Death of his Sister, Mrs. Anne Donnellan, who by her last Will, directed the Remainder to be paid out of her Assets, in order to fulfil Dr. Donnellan's Intention; and the same hath been received, amounting to 415l. 16s. 10½d. The said Mrs. Donnellan, by her said Will, likewise ordered her Household Furniture, Plate, Pictures, Linen, and Books, to be sold, and One Half of the Value thereof to be paid to the Society, without appropriating the same to any particular School: which, amounting to the Sum of 203l. 13s. 10d. hath been paid by her Executors.

Nº XXIV. KILFINANE, County of LIMERICK.

THIS School, which contains Twenty Girls, to which Twenty more are to be added, was built at the sole Expence of the late Robert Oliver, Esq; who endowed it with One Acre of Land Plantation Measure, Rent-free in Perpetuity, and also granted a Lease to the Society of Twenty Acres more for Three Lives, from the first of May, 1738, at 14s. per Acre, the Land being very rich. The Master allows the Society 25s. per Acre.

The Right Hon. Silver Oliver, upon the Society's Application for further Aid, has been pleased to grant to them a Lease of 19A. 2R. 22P. of the said Lands for Three Lives, renewable for ever, from the 1st of May, 1772, at the Yearly Rent of 11. 5s. per Acre, notwithstanding he could have fet the same, as he had done the adjacent Lands, for Two Guineas per Acre, which the Society have thankfully accepted.

The Reverend Archdeacon John Oliver having informed the Society, that the late James Knight, Esq; deceased, had, by Deed, vested in Trustees a Yearly Rent of 70l. 8s. (arising out of Lands in the County of Wicklow) 60l. Yearly whereof he appointed for the support and Maintenance of a Charity School, and that an Arrear of about 800l. was due by the Tenant to the said Lands, for Recovery of which a Suit had been instituted, and was nearly at an End, only waiting for the Master's Report upon the Account; and that he proposed to vest the same in the Society, in order to apply such Part thereof, as is by the said Deed appropriated for the Support of the said Charity School, towards the Enlargement and Maintenance of the Charter Schools at Kilfinane and Kilmallock. The Society did most thankfully accept the Archdeacon's Proposal; and did afterwards

resolve, that upon the said Mr. Knight's charitable Foundation being legally vested in them, the School at Kilfinane should be enlarged, and made fit for the Reception of Twenty Children, in Addition to its then present Establishment of Twenty Children.

The Execution of this is deferred till the Master's report is made, which it is expected will be shortly.

The Rev. Mr. Graves, Incumbent of the Parish, takes no Tithes for the said Lands.

N^o XXV. KILKENNY.
