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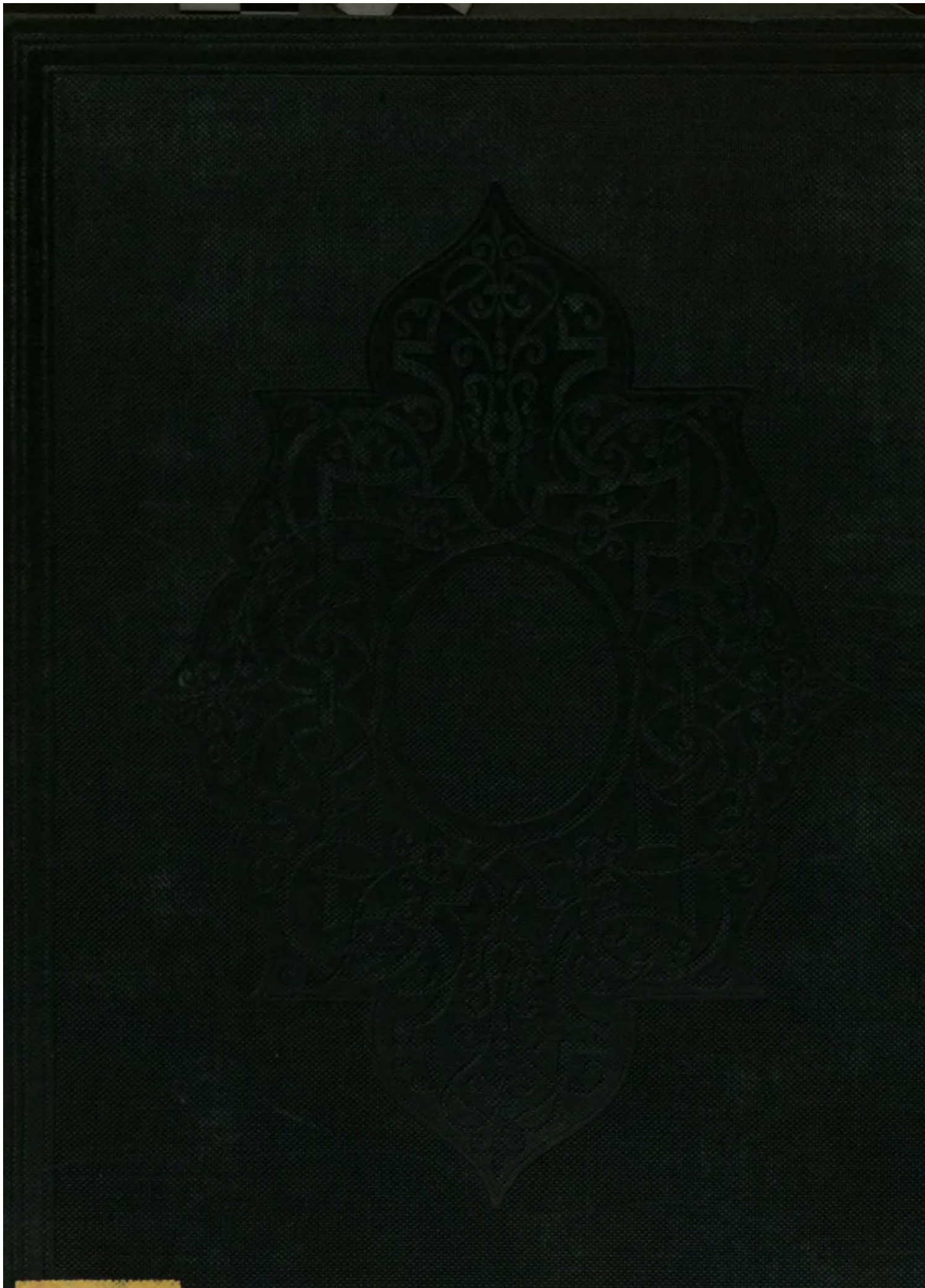

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## PREFACE.

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THE present volume has been printed from a transcript of the Sloane Manuscript in the British Museum No. 886, placed at the disposal of the Camden Society by Sir Charles George Young, Garter King of Arms.

The proof sheets have been collated with the Sloane MS.; this, however, is itself but a transcript, later than Smyth's time. Where the original manuscript of the Obituary is deposited is not at present known.

The best account of Richard Smyth is to be found in Wood's *Athenæ Oxonienses*, whose words we shall copy, subsequently making a few additions to the account of Smyth and his library; premising here, that in the parish register of Lillingston Dayrell, where he was born, and in his own signatures to the London Visitation in the Heralds' College, and to his Will, his name is uniformly spelt SMYTH; whilst upon his monument, and in the Register which records his burial at Cripplegate, it is spelt SMITH. Wood says,

“RICHARD SMITH, the son of a clergyman named Richard Smith, a native of Abingdon (by Martha his wife, daughter of Paul Darrel or Dayrell, of Lillingston Darrel, in Bucks, Esq.), son of Richard, son of another Richard Smith, of Abingdon, in Berks, sometime gent. usher to Qu. Elizabeth, was born at Lillingston Darrel before

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mentioned, an. 1590,\* and after the beginning of the reign of James I. was sent to the university of Oxon., where, his stay being short, he was not matriculated, and therefore I cannot positively tell you of what College or Hall he was a member. Thence he was taken away by his parents, and put a clerk to an attorney belonging to the city of London; but, his mind hanging after learning, he spent all the time he could obtain from his employment in books. At riper years he became Secondary of the Poultry Compter† within the city of Lon-

"Sheriffs in Cities stand upon a different footing from those in Counties: London has the right to both: the right to elect two sheriffs for the city of London; and, the county of Middlesex having by one of the early charters been granted to the citizens, the two sheriffs of London are the sheriff of Middlesex. For the County, they exercise their functions, as in other counties, by an *Under-sheriff*: but in the City it is otherwise: each sheriff was responsible for his own officers; and therefore each sheriff had his own *Compter* or place where his officers accounted to the suitors for the debts they had received for them. These *Compters* were at last fixed in known places; one in the *Poultry*, and the other in *Wood Street*. Instead of one under-sheriff for both Sheriffs, each had his officer, who was called a SECONDARY, or the sheriff's second. Hence these two officers, who continue to the present day, and each performs the functions of an under-sheriff, and also certain contested elections, &c. &c. summoning jurors, &c.

"The Secondaries are usually lawyers, and hence Smith would be well acquainted in his day with those of his craft. It is a highly respectable station, of much responsibility and of some authority. The two present secondaries are Mr. James and Mr. Potter: both highly respectable men. Their station is probably nearly analogous to the station of masters and prothonotaries in the courts of law.

"In 1644, 20th Cha. I. October the 3d, Sir Richard Stone was discharged as Secondary for Wood Street Compter, and another to be admitted by the court of aldermen to try the right and title by a legal course: and on Oct. the 30th in the same year Mr. Nathaniel Hayes was discharged as Secondary of the Poultry Compter for insufficiency, and another to be admitted in the same manner. On Oct. 15th in the same year RICHARD SMITH was admitted as *Secondary of the Poultry Compter*, and John Reading for Wood Street. In 1655, eleven years after, Richard Smith surrendered up his place as Secondary of the Poultry Compter, and Edward Trotman was admitted in his place."

Edward Trotman's death is recorded in p. 88 of Smyth's Obituary.

don, a place of good reputation and profit, being in his time worth about 700*l.* per an., which he executed many years; but upon the death of his son, an. 1655 (begotten on the body of his wife Elizab., daughter of George Deane of Stepney), to whom he intended to resign his place, he immediately sold it, and betook himself wholly to a private life; two-thirds of which at least he spent in his library. He was a person infinitely curious in, and inquisitive after books, and suffered nothing considerable to escape him that fell within the compass of his learning, desiring to be master of no more than he knew how to use. He was constantly known every day to walk his rounds among the booksellers' shops (especially in Little Britain)\* in London, and by his great skill and experience he made choice of such books that were not obvious to every man's eye. He lived in times which ministred peculiar opportunities of meeting with books that were not every day brought into public light; and few eminent libraries were bought where he had not the liberty to pick and chuse. Hence arose, as that vast number of books, so the choiceness and rarity of the greatest part of them, and that of all kinds and in all sorts of learning, especially in history, of which he had the most considerable writers of all ages and nations, antient and modern, especially of our own and the neighbouring nations, of which, as 't was

Little Britain and Duck Lane were the Paternoster Row and Creed Lane of modern times. Duck Lane is now Duke Street, Smithfield. The Ballards were the last of the old race of booksellers who inhabited Little Britain.



thought, there was scarce any thing wanting that was extant. He was also a great collector of MSS. whether antient or modern, that were now extant, and delighted much to be poring on them. He collected also abundance of pamphlets published at and before the time of reformation of religion, relating to ecclesiastical affairs, and it was supposed that the copies of some of them were not then extant in the world, and therefore esteemed as choice as MSS. Among the books relating to history were his collection of lives, the elogia of illustrious men, the authors who have written the lives and characters of writers, and such who have writ of the foundations of monasteries. Nor was he the owner of this choice treasure of books as an idle possessor, nor did he barely turn over the leaves, but was a constant peruser of, and upon his buying did generally collate them, observed the defects of impressions, the ill arts used by many, and compared the differences of editions; concerning which and the like cases he with great diligence and industry entred many memorable and very useful remarks and observations upon very many of his books under his own hand. He hath written,

“*Letter to Dr. Hen. Tacitus.* 2. *The Order of receiving the new Bishop after his Consecration, before he enter into the Cathedral Church of Salisbury;* taken out of an old MS. ritual belonging to that church: and from French into English, *Bosquire’s Sermon before the Company of Shoemakers in France, an. 1614, on the festival of S. Crispin and Crispiana.*

“ Besides these and others of his writing and translations, he made ten thousand instances or remarks, with his own hand, of authors, either in or before the title or in the margin of their works.

“ This Mr. Rich. Smith, who was a man of an excellent temper, great justice, &c. died 26 March, in sixteen hundred seventy and five, and was buried in the church of S. Giles’s near to Cripplegate in London. Soon after was a marble monument erected over his grave for him, his wife, and children, with an inscription thereon,

which for brevity's sake I shall now pass by. Afterwards there was a design to buy his choice library for a public use, by a collection of moneys to be raised among generous persons; but the work being public, and therefore but little forwarded, it came into the hands of Richard Chiswell, a bookseller living in S. Paul's churchyard, London; who printing a catalogue of, with others added to them, which came out after Mr. Smith's death, they were exposed to sale by way of Auction, and to the great reluctancy of public-spirited men, in May and June 1682."\*

The monument of Smith, his wife, and sons, mentioned by Wood, is still to be seen against a pillar on the north side of the chancel of St. Giles's Cripplegate. Small figures of himself and his wife, in the attitude of prayer, on each side of a desk, appear in the upper part of the monument; and under the inscription recumbent figures of his two sons, still more diminutive in size. The following is the double Inscription:

"MR. RICHARD  
SMITH, deceased y<sup>e</sup> 26 of  
March, 1675, aged 85."

"Neare this place lyeth interred MRS. ELIZABETH SMITH, the wife of Mr. Richard Smith, sometymes Secondary of the Poultry Compter, by whom shee had 5 sonnes & 3 dauthters, whereof two onely suruiued her. Her life was pious & religious towards God, blamelesse towards men, exceeding pittiful and charitable to y<sup>e</sup> poore and distressed, prudent & prouident in the ordering her family, haueing a great care & tender affection to her husband and to the instru<sup>o</sup>n of her children & children's children in the fear of the Lord. Shee dyed the 25 of May, 1664, aged 64 yeares. Here also lyes buried 2 of her sonnes; John Smith, the eldest, beloued of all men for his affable deportment, admired for his more then ordinary guifts of nature. Hee dyed (to y<sup>e</sup> great greife of his parents and frends) the 6<sup>th</sup> of May, 1655, aged 32 yeares; and Richard the youngest dyed in the 17<sup>th</sup>e yeare of his age, the 10<sup>th</sup> of August, 1653;

in comemoration of whom their tender & louing mother willed this monum<sup>t</sup> to bee erected, w<sup>ch</sup> after her death was (by her appointment) at her owne priuate cost (by her frends) p<sup>r</sup>formed."

His will, dated 5th March 1669, was proved 12th April 1675, by Martha Hacker, his eldest daughter. It is written in a strain of piety, apparently by himself, and consists chiefly of money legacies to his near relations. His moveables, including his Books, he bequeathed to the favourite daughter and executrix who has been already mentioned as proving his will.

Beside the works of Smyth already mentioned, two others are preserved in manuscript in the Sloane Collection.

No. 772. "Of the first Invention of the Art of Printing," 4to. upon a fly-leaf at the beginning of which is written, "This booke was written by my worthy good friend and diligent antiquary Richard Smyth, sometime Secondary of the Compter in the Poultry. Teste F. Barnard."

The Sale Catalogue of Smyth's library, with manuscript prices, formerly in Mr. Bindley's Collection, is now in the British Museum. Its Title, Address to the Reader, and Conditions of the Sale, will not be unacceptable; followed by a small selection of the prices brought by particular works. The catalogue is of the large quarto size, closely printed, and occupies no fewer than four hundred and four pages. The biddings in some instances appear to have advanced a penny at a time.

“ *TO THE READER.*

“ Though it be needless to recommend what to all intelligent persons will sufficiently commend itself, yet perhaps it may not be unacceptable to the ingenious to have some short account concerning this so much celebrated, so often desired, so long expected, Library, now exposed to sale.

“ The gentleman that collected it was a person infinitely curious and inquisitive after books, and who suffered nothing considerable to escape him that fell within the compass of his learning ; for he had not the vanity of desiring to be master of more than he knew how to use. He lived to a very great age, and spent a good part of it almost intirely in the search of books, being as constantly known every day to walk his rounds through the shops as he sat down to meals, where his great skill and experience enabled him to make choice of what was not obvious to every vulgar eye. He lived in times which ministred peculiar opportunities of meeting with books that are not every day brought into publick light ; and few eminent libraries were bought where he had not the liberty to pick and choose. And while others were forming arms and new modelling kingdoms, his great ambition was to become master of a good book. Hence arose, as that vast number of his books, so the choiceness and rarity of the greatest part of them, and that of all kinds, and in all sorts of learning.

“ No more need be instanced in than that of History, wherein here are the most considerable historians of all ages and nations, ancient and modern, and among them those especially of our own and the neighbour nations, whereof I believe there is scarce any thing wanting that is extant ; and among the Manuscripts several things that were never yet printed ; besides abundance of Pamphlets publisht at and before the times of Reformation, relating to ecclesiastical affairs, whereof it is reasonable to believe there are no other copies now extant in the world (with multitudes of others of latter

times). Together with History may go along the Collection of Lives, "Elogia Virorum illustrium," the writers "de Scriptoribus," and of the Foundations of Monasteries, &c. perhaps the best and largest collection of that kind that is in any private library in this nation. Indeed the whole is so considerable that it is commonly known that the most learned men in these parts, and those who have the best libraries of their own, were wont frequently to have recourse to This, for things not to be had elsewhere.

"Nor was the owner of them a meer idle possessor of so great a treasure; for, as he generally collated his books upon the buying of them (upon which account the buyer may rest pretty secure of their being perfect), so he did not barely turn over the leaves, but observed the defects of impressions, and the ill arts used by many; compared the differences of editions, concerning which and the like cases he has entred memorable and very useful remarks upon very many of the books, under his own hand; observations wherein certainly never man was more diligent and industrious.

"Thus much was thought fit to be communicated to publick notice by a gentleman who was intimately acquainted both with Mr. Smith and his books.

"This excellent library will be exposed by auction, and the sale will begin on Monday the 15th day of May next, at the auction house known by the name of the Swan, in Great St. Bartholomew Close, and there continued, day by day, the five first days of every week, till all the books be sold."

*"The Conditions of the Sale are these:*

"I. That he who bids most is the buyer; and if any difference arise which the company cannot decide, then the book or books shall be forthwith exposed to sale again.

"II. That all the books in this catalogue, not otherwise expressed (for ought I know), are perfect; but if any of them appear to be otherwise before they be taken away the buyer shall have his choice of taking or leaving them.

"III. That the money for the book or books so bought is to be paid by the buyer within one month after the auction is ended, at the place where they are sold, where constant attendance shall be given, for that month, day by day, from eight a clock to eleven, and from two till five, for receipt of the money and delivery of the books.

“ IV. That the buyer and seller do mutually bind their respective executors and administrators to the performance of these conditions.

“ V. That no person be admitted a buyer who, being a stranger to the seller or company, shall refuse to tell the place of his abode.

“ VI. That no person be admitted a buyer that has refused or denyed to pay for any books he has bought at any former auction.

“ For satisfaction of the buyers as to the condition of the books, they will be exposed to view at the place above mentioned, every day for a fortnight before the sale begins.

Something must now be said of the OBITUARY itself.

A few Extracts from it are preserved in the Harleian MS. 3361, in the handwriting of John Bagford: and a Selection, perhaps to the amount of a fourth part, was made from its entries, and printed by Peck, in the second Volume of the "Desiderata Curiosa." But even he did not see the points in which its best value consists.

For the period through which it extends, it is a useful Record for the Citizens of London; and for any one engaged in a work intended to illustrate the History of the Metropolis during Smyth's time, almost indispensable.

Dugdale, in his "Origines Juridiciales," gives no List of the Heads of the Law in this country from 1640 to 1660; nor is the deficiency, the Editor believes, supplied in any other printed work. Smyth was a member of the profession; and, as far as a Law-Necrology goes, has filled the hiatus.

In the Catalogue of Sir William Musgrave's Prints, in the Tenth Day's Sale, No. 82, we find a contemporary Portrait of "Richard Smith; virtuoso and literary character," engraved by "W. Sherwin." This was our Richard Smyth. The purchaser of it was Sir Mark Masterman Sykes, at the price of £7.17.0. At Sir Mark Sykes's

sale it was again sold for £5. 5. 0.: and is believed to have been bought for Richard Heber, Esq.: but the editor of the present volume has been unable to trace it further, or to obtain the knowledge of any other Impression. Bromley, in his "Catalogue of Engraved British Portraits," p. 129, says, "I never saw this Print."

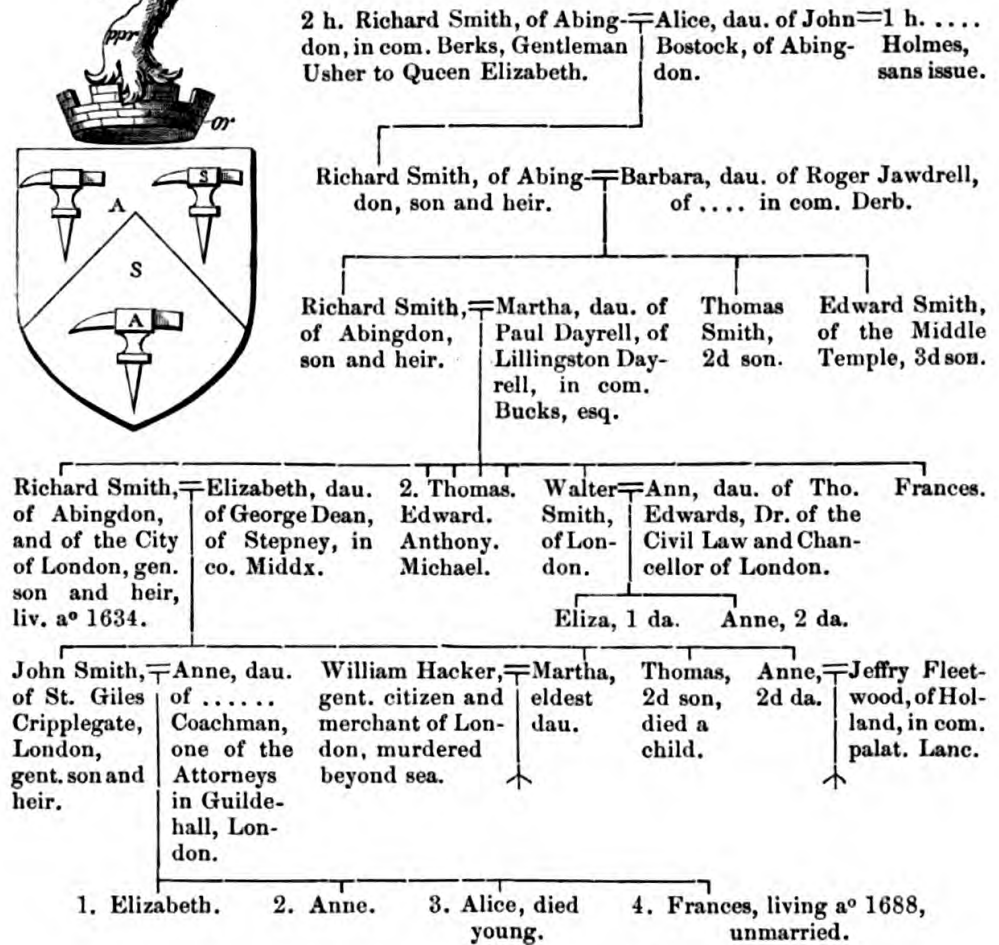
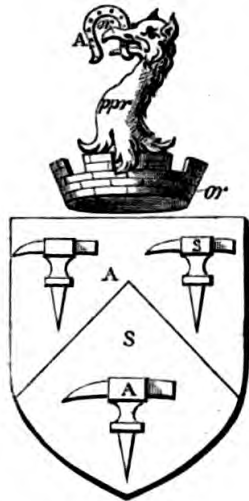
It has been already shown that Smyth was a man of good family, well connected; as is further seen in the accompanying Pedigree, which has been obligingly communicated by Sir Charles Young from the Records of the College of Arms. It illustrates many of the entries in the Obituary. Smyth however, throughout the placid tenor of his life, never failed to chronicle in it the deaths of his relations and connexions, however humble their condition in society might have become.

18. Major John Grant of Birching Lane, died of y<sup>e</sup> jaunios; buried April 22 in St. Dunstan's in y<sup>e</sup> West (as is reported) a Roman Catholick; an understanding man, of a quick witt and a pretty schollar, my old acquaintance.
18. Mr. Rich. Meridale, once a scrivener, and an attorn. of y<sup>e</sup> Comon Pleas (near y<sup>e</sup> Charterhouse), died this night in Barbican, Criplegate parish (noe friend of my sister Edney's).
11. M<sup>rs</sup> Jacomb, wife to Dr. Jacomb (once minister of St. Martyn's Ludgate,) who died April 8th at the Countess of Exeter's house in Little Brittain, and was buried from thence Apr. 11.
28. Mr. Joseph Clarke, once Mr. Tim. Garthwait's apprentice, bookseller in Little Brittain, buried.
- May* 8. Auditor Beale, in Hatton Garden, cast himselfe out of his upper window (as is by most believed) into his yard, of which fall he died imediately, the moving cause unknown. He had a wife and 2 children living. He died worth a great estate in lands and monies. Some pretend that it was by accident, others through frenzie, wherewith otherwiles he was possessed, whereof the coroner's enquest found that he perished by throwing himselfe downe in his frantick fitt.
- Dr. Sabastian Smith, a prebend of Christ Church in Oxford, eldest son to my unckle Edw. Smith, died this month.
- June* 11. Mary Winston, wife to Edw. Winston, carpenter in Beech Lane in Criplegate parish, died about mid-

- night (St. Barnabas' Day); buried in Criplegate parish June 14. Mr. Smithers preached; my sister Edney, Betty and Nan. Hacker only of our family invited to y<sup>e</sup> buriall, my daught<sup>r</sup> Hacker being at Eaton.
- July* 23. Hen. Neason, son of . . . . Neason (a porter), brother in law to my sister Edney, who died at St. Bartholomew's Hospital; buried from thence this day.
- August* 7. Died, M<sup>is</sup> Anne Badger, wife of Mr. Allen Badger of Hagerston, near Hoggesson, in the parish of St. Leonard Shorditch; buried Aug. 11th. Dr. Hatfield preached on Psalm 144, 4 ver. my daughter Hacker (only of our family invited) had a ring at her buriall.
- August.* About this time died Serenus Cressey in Sussex; he wrote and published y<sup>e</sup> Church History of Brittain in folio, 1668.
22. M<sup>is</sup> Mary Leigh, wife to Mr. Edw. Leigh, secondary of Wood Street Compter, died in childbed of a male child, the 7th child of 4 males and 3 females; her funerall was carried from her house in Great St. Bartholomew's where she died, to Ivor near Uxbridg to be buried.
- Septem.* 11. Bridget Underwood, a young maid who came out of Gloucestershire to London w<sup>th</sup> our maid Kate Butter to gett her a service, dying of the small pox at her unckle's in the Strand, this day buried.
20. Andrew Crooke, bookseller, this evening died, being well the day before among his acquaintance in Little Brittain; my old acquaintance.
23. My cosen Windham Dayrell, 3rd son of my cosen Sir Thom. Dayrell, died this night.
30. About 7 or 8 in the morning died at the Tower, old Mr. Talbot Edwards, keeper of y<sup>e</sup> Crowne and other of his Maj<sup>ties</sup> Jewells under Sir Gilbert Talbot, Master of

the King's Jewell house, aged about 78 years, some say 80 ; buried in St. Peter's Church in the Tower, Oct. 1. Mr. Giffard of St. Dunstan's in y<sup>e</sup> East made his funerall sermon.

- Octob<sup>r</sup>.* 4. Mr. Wm. Lorrindg, confectioner, died at his house in the country.
- Novem.* 15. John Milton died at Bunhill near Morefields in Criplegate parish, blind some time before he died.
9. Died at Rouen in France Sir Edward Hide, Earl of Clarendon, once Lord Chancellor of England, in place succeeded Sir Orlando Bridgman, Lord Keeper; buried at Westminster, Munday Jan. 4, 1674.
4. Buried in Criplegate Church old Thomas Came, a taylor, from his house in Jewen Street, formerly dwelling in Wood Street, where I long since knew him to be a journyman of Criplegate Ward.
18. M<sup>is</sup> Dionysia Jones, wife of deputy Jones, buried this day from Lorimers' Hall at St. Giles w<sup>th</sup>out Criplegate; my daughter Hacker and sister Edney had tickets and gold rings.
21. Died Thomas Quarterman, parish clerk of St. Giles Criplegate; buried the 23rd, to whose buriall I was invited.
- Decem.* 15. Died my cosen Wicks, sister to my cosen Paul Dayrell, at her house at Lillingston Dayrell, Bucks.
- Januar.* 1. My Lady Mary, late wife to Sir Robert Vynor, now Lord Mayor of London, sickned on Munday last and died Jan. 1, 1674; a great loss to Sir Robert Vynor, she having during her life 2000*li.* p<sup>r</sup> ann. and her only daughter by Mr. Hide having 4000*li.* p<sup>r</sup> ann. (he being her former husbsnd). Her funerall on Tuesday Janua. 19, from Goldsmiths' Hall to St. Mary Wolnoth in Lombard Street.
3. This day was buried Luther Smith, a male child of

Thomas Smith, a millener w<sup>th</sup>out Bishopsgate, who died on Friday last, and was baptized the Sunday before (my sister Edney their acquaintance), invited to the buriall; there born on Decem. 13 last.

8. M<sup>is</sup> Moyer's old maide in Rope Makers' Alley, aged about 70 years, who had been servant to old M<sup>is</sup> Moyer and son 50 years, was buried in Southwark; she was worth 400*li*. she had gott in her long service.
15. This day died the old Countess of Devonshire, at her house in Southampton Buildings in y<sup>e</sup> parish of St. Giles in the Fields.
- Februa.* 18. . . . . Philips, Judge of y<sup>e</sup> Sheriffs' Court in London, died.
19. Capt. Farre in Little Morefields buried.

- March* 26. Friday, old Mr. Richard Smith, my honoured friend, aged 85 years, dyed and was buried in Criplegate Church on y<sup>e</sup> 1st of April following; he was y<sup>e</sup> collector of the aforesaid Catalogue, and of many most excellent Books; he was a just man and of good report, and worthy of imitation.
