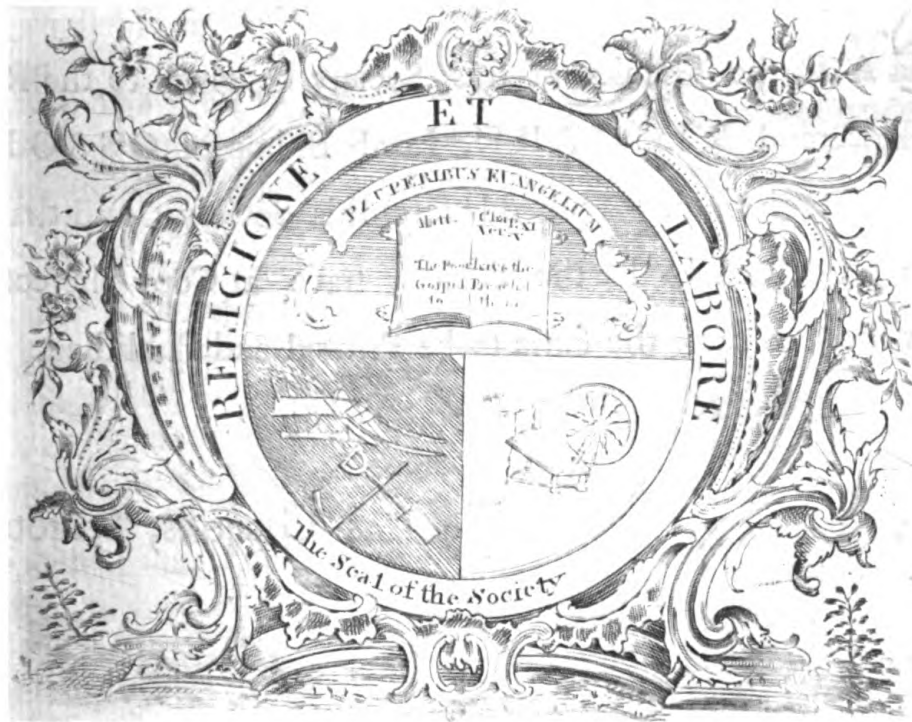

I THESSALONIANS, Ch. II. Ver. 19, 20.

*For what is our Hope, or Joy, or Crown of Re-  
joycing? Are not even ye in the Presence of our  
Lord Jesus Christ, at his coming?*

*For ye are our Glory and Joy.*

**S** AINT Paul begins this Epistle with informing the *Thessalonians* how mindful he was of them in his Prayers, as well as in his Thanksgivings to God on Account of the great Proficiency they had made in the Christian Religion :

A N D proceeds to assure them, that he was thoroughly convinced of their being perfectly grounded in every Respect as to their most holy Faith.

H E then proceeds to remind them of the Manner in which he had conducted himself, in order to bring them to the Knowledge of the Truth: And at the same Time, to encourage them to go on from Perfection to Perfection, he sets out to them in proper Colours, the Readiness with which they had entertained and embraced the Salvation offered to them.

U P O N all which Occasions, he expresses the great Desire he had to see them: And concludes that Part, with glorying in them, according to the Words of the Text :

*For what is our Hope or Joy, or Crown of Rejoycing? Are not even ye in the Presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming? For ye are our Glory and Joy.*

A N D

AND certainly a most rational Foundation it was for this stedfast Hope that he should joy and rejoyce over them in the Presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his Coming: As he actually declared that at that present Time, they were his Glory and Joy.

AND such must be the Effect of every laudable Undertaking for the Salvation of Mankind: Such must be the Consequence of every happy Success that attends any good and great Enterprize:

WHICH doubtless must in a very extraordinary Manner be applicable to the present Institution, to the Promoters and Directors of it.

As the Advantages are most manifest, so they need very little Explanation to those who are thoroughly acquainted with the Nature and Success of it.

HOWEVER, it may be considered as in some Measure tending to deliver us from great Evils, and to secure to us solid and lasting Advantages; and more especially with regard to a few Circumstances, some of which may not have been sufficiently attended to by many Persons.

AND this I shall attempt in as few Words as possible.

Such as are merely of a civil Nature, must be obvious to all, and have doubtless been frequently enlarged on, upon these Occasions.

As in Relation to the Objects of this Charity: The unhappy Children of those who are depressed by the utmost Poverty; and under this Institution, from Dirt and Nakedness are kept clean, and decently apparelled; from being ill fed and lodged, are supplied with wholesome Food and proper Habitations; instead of being abandoned to an idle and dissolute Life, are accustomed to useful Labour, and to a Regularity of Manners.

ALL which Particulars have a visible good Effect on the Mind, and general Behaviour, as well as on the Health of the Body, the Reputation, and the Increase of Property.

AND

AND even tho' some of them may be seduced back, yet it will not even with regard to those be without Advantage to the Public, that they have had this Education; in which good Principles of Morality, as well as Religion are instilled; and they have been bred up to Cleanliness and Industry.

I SAY these are Circumstances too obvious to be repeated: Nor would I enter into particular Disputes relative to Religion, as the Subject of them is well known to those to whom this Discourse may be of Use:

THO' it may be necessary to touch on the general Manner of proceeding in different Professions, without entering into Doctrines that are foreign to this Point.

BUT I shall chiefly insist on the Advantages arising from this Institution in one Light; as it would very happily lead us to Unanimity, both with regard to religious and civil Affairs: For even with respect to Temporals, it is certainly a very happy Ingredient towards the Prosperity of the State, that the Subjects should be firmly united among themselves.

AND it seems at all Times, to be really a false Policy to attempt to correct any Excess in Constitution or Practice by promoting Discord.

BUT with regard to Religion, a want of Unanimity is still more fatal, as it strikes at the Root of that Charity, which is the Bond of all Virtue, and the Life of Religion.

THERE are also other very weighty Reasons to enforce the Duty to be of one Mind in religious Affairs, and one of the Principal is, that it often affects our civil Rights; as the different Temperaments of Religion are found to have an Effect on the civil Constitution.

FOR Instance, there is a Profession of Religion we do not choose, which, whatever Errors we think it may have run into in other Respects, we judge that it is more friendly to arbitrary Government, than to that happy Mixture of Powers which we enjoy.

AND the Reason is that this Government partakes of its own Complexion, for that which is of a despotic Nature is claimed in Religion; and an infallible Judge is set up, as allowed by many of them, whose Will is a Law.

ON the other Hand, a Profession without any Head, governed by Pastor and People, is not pleased with a Civil Institution in which one Head presides and an Aristocracy of Nobles is formed, that bears a Share in the legislative and executive Power; and with the Power of the People, all well tempered together, is esteemed the happiest Constitution in the World.

AND the Religion which favours it, is that which is established alone in these Kingdoms, in the greatest Perfection.

THEREFORE, it is for the Civil Interests of these Realms, that this Profession which we firmly believe, is true Religion, should be made as extensive as possible.

BUT there are many other Evils that arise from a want of Unanimity both in political and religious Affairs, which affect our Civil and Spiritual Interests.

SUCH as on the one Hand, ill founded, extravagant Notions of prior Right; As Law gives a Right at first; and consequently can transfer it: Also many uncharitable Reflections; As that the Professors of all other Sects are in Possession of no Religion; and a Consequence of this, the being bred up in a Contempt of others, and in a vain Opinion of their future Condemnation: From which follow, a free Invasion of Property, as far as is consistent with Safety; The keeping no Faith; A want of all Veracity; And every unsocial Disposition which can be worked up by Conceit of their own System, a Disregard for others, as they think, in a want of every religious Advantage; All artfully instilled by those who are made Use of as the Instruments to the worldly Grandeur of their Superiors; and who, many of them, are doubtless ignorant that they are destined for those Ends: Tho' they may feel others also, which come more home  
to



to them, and are without Doubt, a still more sensible Spur to Industry, in those who seek Theirs, as well as Them.

Now the Consequences of all these Things, are those Distractions with which we sometimes see a Country most miserably torn to Pieces, and kept down by such Enemies within it's own Bowels: Evils little regarded by those who are in some Sense abstracted from them and from most other Communities.

AND if any Profession, from such ill founded Notions, should be thought to have a Tendency to lead its Votaries to act without Veracity and Justice with Regard to the Whole or any particular Part of the Community, the Effect of it must be highly prejudicial to the Interests of Society, as it will be found exceedingly difficult for want of proper Hands to carry on any Thing for the Public Good: And if the Example should be so contagious, as to spread itself in some Degree through almost all Sorts of People; the Condition of such a State must be most deplorable, considered in this Light: And it can be supported no other Way, than by particular Persons in Power, who will set themselves against such an evil Spirit, and in every Respect, watch and act for the Public Good.

BUT of what Consequence soever Unanimity, and suppressing such Principles may be to Society; the natural Liberty of Mankind is of still greater Moment; and it is better that there should be a Want, both as to the one and the other, than that he should be deprived of that Liberty: And we have a striking Instance of this in a free State, as to a Liberty in every one of living where he pleases in Time of profound Peace, tho' the particular Society may suffer by it: So every one has a natural Liberty to take Care of his Soul as he pleases, it is his own individual Safety, it is a Sort of Self-preservation, the Laws of which are necessary with Regard to the Body; the Danger as to the Soul is always impending, and must move us, if we allow ourselves Time to think.

So that every one must judge, where there is Liberty, to whose Guidance, if he is ignorant, he will entrust his spiritual Affairs: When he is deprived of this Liberty he will often think for himself; and place himself at least in an invincible Manner, with that Church which he inwardly applauds.

So that unless any particular Professions are judged dangerous to the State, every Profession of Religion ought to be tolerated: And if some Kind of Restraints are judged necessary for the sake of the public Weal in good and free Governments; they are usually suspended in some Degree in Times of Security; and only put in Execution in Times of Danger, to prevent public Concourse, and other Inconveniences to the State.

THESE are the Evils on the one Hand, which we see in some Cases must be borne to a certain Degree:

ON the other, such Persons as are the Subjects of these Passions and Conduct, and must in some Measure oppose themselves to them, cannot but think, that there is a want of the distinguishing Charity; That they must be ever on their Guard, in perpetual Fear; and in general, in such Circumstances as must deprive of many social Blessings of Life; except with some few good Natures whom no Education can corrupt.

MUST not that therefore be esteemed a happy Institution which is calculated to defend against all evil Principles whatsoever that may disunite us: To correct the blind Zeal of such as may be led by the false Notion, That they may do any Thing for what they call the Glory of that God, who can give Success to proper Means, to every honest Endeavour, and does not stand in Need of such Policy as is directly contrary to his Laws: And the making use of such Means must argue a want of true Faith.

And it is a great Misfortune, that Religion is often made use of as a Tool to political Ends, otherwise, what could induce any Persons to use evil Means for what they pretend to be good Ends?

FOR

FOR if God Almighty has appointed certain Means for the Salvation of Mankind; what can influence any one to make use of other Means? For those which he has pointed out are Doctrine, Evidence, Persuasion: If others are practised, it is a certain Proof that (with the Directors at least) there are other Views than those of Religion, which must be temporal Interests: But we see how it has succeeded with those who have been the greatest Abettors of those Principles: For if God be against them, their worldly Wisdom availeth not: If God be for us, it is of no Consequence who is against us:

Now all these are Circumstances which are the Effect of a want of Unanimity, of extravagant Notions instilled for certain Ends; and we see are attended with many civil and religious Inconveniencies.

So that if there is any Institution which is calculated to defend against such pernicious Principles, and to endeavour to bring to a happy Agreement both in Faith and Practice, it must be looked on as highly advantageous in a civil and religious Sense.

AND it is indeed an absolute Duty to promote by all proper Means the public Good, as well as what we judge to be the true Religion:

FOR it is incumbent on every Community to endeavour to forward the Interests of Truth, of the Religion that it judges to be true, which the Practice of it naturally implies; to promote it by all proper Means, as by Reason and Persuasion; but without Force on the Person; unless any one renders himself liable by a Transgression of the Civil Laws of Society: The Community also may restrain Property, so as to encourage a perfect Agreement among the Subjects for the Good of the State, and that more especially, when Principles are maintained which they judge may strike at the Safety and Peace of Society.

IF there are any who pretend to still greater inherent Powers, and actually exercise them when they have Opportunity, they ought not to complain that we make use of such Powers, according to Law, as we judge may be of Advantage to the Community; of which every State must, in the Nature of the Thing be the proper and only Judge, and will act accordingly.

THE Mind indeed must be persuaded of the Truth of Religion, which consists in a Conformity to the Divine Oracles: As to the Interpretation of which indeed the universal Consent must be thought to be of great Weight; which was not obtained in the first Ages, no more than it has been since those Times, to any other essential Doctrines than what we profess; to which Ages therefore we must look back.

AND if there are any, who finding Truth and Reason against them, have Recourse to the weakest and most irrational Means of Persuasion, As Boasting Asseverations of their own Profession, those of the utmost Contempt and Reproach as to all others; and a most weak Declaration by Way of Persuasion, which can have effect only on those who are in a very low State as to their reasoning Faculties, that is, that they will give their own Souls as a Security; which if they believe what they avow, is a Mark of their Sincerity, but no Proof of the Truth of any particular Profession of Religion: For the sincere Professor of every Sect of Religion may affirm the same, tho' more generous than to offer it as an Argument or Reason.

BUT under the Shield of Faith in Christ Jesus, the Rock on which his Church is built; under Christ Jesus the sole Head of the Universal Church Militant, the glorious Judge and Rewarder of the Church Triumphant, We can do no more with those who must not hear either Scripture or Reason than appeal to that Day, when we shall see who will be saved, When we are confident we shall meet with that Justice, as to Doctrine, from the Great Judge, which we cannot experience from some of our Brethren.

BUT

BUT I say, if there are any who act and pretend to Reason in the Manner already mentioned, against them we ought to defend ourselves by such Institutions as that which is the Subject of our present Meeting; in order to ground and fix them in the established Religion, against all other Professions whatsoever.

For it is the Duty of every Society, to endeavour to prevent public Evils, and to promote whatever may be for the Advantage of the established Constitution.

WE ought therefore, to use our utmost Endeavours to make this Education as extensive as we possibly can: For it is contrived to unite us in what we are fully convinced is the State of true Primitive Christianity, and to secure to us every civil and religious Advantage, as well as to defend us against many Evils.

NOW the Means must be, To increase the Fund, and to contrive to bring in as large a Number as we can to enjoy the great Advantages of this Education.

THE first depends both on the Public, and on private Contributions.

THE former on the Legislature, who will be influenced by the proper Application, as well as from the great Usefulness of it.

AND they must be convinced, that they cannot open the Hand more for our Advantage as to the future Prosperity of our Country.

PRIVATE Charities are also a great Enlargement.

BUT in making it thus Extensive, we must take care not to direct to any particular Profession only, and always to breed some of them, a proper Proportion to those Employments which relate to Agriculture: Otherwise, we may want Hands in that most necessary and valuable Profession.

AND it may be considered, whether it would not operate most effectually, and if there were a Fund sufficient, not more slowly, by taking in, at least in the provincial Schools,

all deserted Infants of what Age soever, and even, if possible, in every School, to be properly disposed of, as the Society shall direct.

AND in order to induce the Public to enlarge the Fund to enable, there is no Need of mentioning one Circumstance for that Purpose, and that is, that they would find it very alarming; as only one of this Kind, in another Way, has already been found by Experience.

AND in this Institution dispersed over the whole Kingdom, one Objection would be answered, that it would not drain the People to any one Part: A few Schools in every Province applied entirely this Way would compleat that End.

IT is hoped therefore, that at least, the Experiment will be made: A public Fund may effectually secure Success.

I SHALL conclude, with some short Observations on the laudable Encouragement and Application as to this Institution:

FROM which it will appear, that the Reason is strong, why we should esteem it our Hope, Joy, and Glory, and Crown of Rejoycing; that it will be so as long as we live, and more especially hereafter, in the Presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his Coming.

THE laudable and zealous Rise of this Institution can never be sufficiently admired and praised; at the same Time that it cannot be expected, but that it must meet with the most opprobrious Treatment from those whom it cannot but greatly alarm:

WHEN once we were convinced of the great Usefulness of it to heal our Breaches and close our Wounds, it must have been naturally encouraged; as we could not but be sensible of the great Advantages of it; and particularly of it's good Effect to unite us by every civil and religious Tye.

BUT what is most to be admired, is, the great Countenance it has met with in *England*, chiefly owing to the extraordinary Charity and Zeal of Persons of considerable Property, who have generously bestowed on this great Occasion,  
which

which has such a remarkable Tendency to promote every Interest of a State that has been so unfortunately divided within itself.

IF it is our Hope and Joy and Crown of Rejoycing, much more must it be to those who bestow of their Abundance; (it must be said to their Honour) in a more disinterested Manner :

FOR which they must be entitled to a greater future Reward, as they are to a greater present Reputation.

BUT the grand Resource is the Public Countenance ; and we trust (especially in the Time of Peace, which we hope is approaching) that it will be very greatly encouraged.

AND the Public as well as private Persons, may more cheerfully open the Hand, as they must be satisfied of the properest Application by those who generously bestow so much of their Time with great Care and Pains in carrying on this excellent Work with the utmost Judgment and Integrity ; to whom it ought to be, in a more particular Manner, a Glory and Joy, as well as the Subject of future Hope and Reward :

SUCH an Application as must ever do Honour to the Parties concerned in it.

AND we hope that many in proper Stations who are entering on the Stage of the World, will apply to this great Work, to ease such as have laboured for a considerable Time, and ought to have a Respite ; as well as to continue a Succession of Labourers in this useful Harvest.

AND those who have a Share in the final Execution, must have also a great Share both in the Glory and the Remcompence ; on whom the Success does in a great Measure depend as to the Completion of it ; carried on indeed chiefly when neglected of others (which too often happens) by some one Person in a particular Station :

AND as on the one Hand, it cannot but be much to the Credit of such Persons ; so on the other, it must be a great Reproach to them when particular Seminaries are neglected ;

as it must proceed from a Defect as to their Care of such a valuable and promising Part of their Flock, as they must be, if proper Pains were bestowed on them :

AND to every good Pastor such a Nursery under his Eye and Direction must afford an extraordinary Pleasure and Satisfaction in securing the growing Hopes of the present and next Generation in this inferior, but useful Station of Life.

AND in relation to every Person concerned in this Institution, which without the least Doubt, exceeds any in the World, it must, as the Apostle expresses it, *be their Hope and Joy and Crown of Rejoycing.*

IT must give a most extraordinary Pleasure in the Act, in the Prospect of the Success, and in the Hope of the future Reward, in the Presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his Coming.

As we may at this present Time say with the greatest Reason, in the Words of the Apostle,

*For ye are our Glory and Joy.*

## A B S T R A C T

O F

## His MAJESTY'S ROYAL CHARTER,

For Erecting and Promoting *English* Protestant Schools  
in *I R E L A N D*.

**G**EORGE the Second, by the Grace of God, of *Great Britain, France and Ireland*, King, Defender of the Faith, &c.—To all Persons to whom these Presents shall come. — Forasmuch as we have received Information by the Petition of the Lord Primate, Lord Chancellor, Archbishops, Noblemen, Bishops, Judges, Gentry, and Clergy of our Kingdom of *Ireland*, That in many Parts of the said Kingdom, there are great Tracts of Land almost intirely inhabited by Papists, who are kept by their Clergy in great Ignorance of the true Religion, and bred up in great Disaffection to the Government : That the erecting of *English* Protestant Schools in those Places, is absolutely necessary for their Conversion ; that the *English* Parish Schools already established are not sufficient for that Purpose ; nor can the Residence of the Parochial Clergy only, fully answer that End.

To

To the Intent therefore, that the Children of the *Popish*, and other poor Natives of the said Kingdom, may be instructed in the *English* Tongue, and the Principles of true Religion and Loyalty, and that so good a Design may the more effectually be carried on; The Lord Lieutenant, and some of the Chief Nobility, Gentry, and Clergy of the said Kingdom, are appointed Commissioners to execute the Purposes of this Charter, and have a Power to elect others in the Room of their deceased Members; and are constituted a Corporation or Body Politic, by the Name of *The Incorporated SOCIETY in Dublin for promoting English Protestant Schools in Ireland*: And are capable to receive and enjoy in Fee, and in Perpetuity, any Manors, Lands, Tenements, &c. the same not exceeding the Value of Two Thousand Pounds *per Annum*, and any Sum or Sums of Money, that shall be given them by any Person or Persons, Bodies Politic and Corporate, &c. to be applied for the Establishing and Supporting *English* Protestant Schools, in such Places of the Kingdom as they shall think proper.

The said Society is impowered to nominate and appoint School-masters and School-mistresses, to be approved and licensed by the Archbishops and Bishops respectively, to continue during the Pleasure of the said Society; who are to be supported by the Society, and provided with all Things necessary for the Instruction of the poor Children in the Principles of the Protestant Religion, Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, as likewise with proper Books, and all necessary Materials fit for teaching them Husbandry, Housewifery, Trades, Manufactures, &c. in order to bring them up to Virtue, Labour and Industry.

The Society is likewise impowered to nominate Persons to receive Subscriptions, Benefactions, &c. in any Part of his Majesty's Dominions, from all well-disposed Persons.—The Society may elect and admit Subscribers (being Protestants) to be Members, to assist in carrying on the Design aforesaid.

# PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

INCORPORATED SOCIETY in *Dublin* for promoting *English* Protestant Schools in IRELAND, from the Opening of His late Majesty's Royal Charter, *February 6, 1733,* to *March 25, 1762.*

**T**HE Original Design of this Society is well known to have been principally formed by the late Right Revd. Dr. *Henry Maule*, Lord Bishop of *Dromore*, afterwards of *Meath*; which being highly approved and encouraged by the then Lords Justices, and a great Number of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, of the Commons, the Clergy and principal Gentlemen of the Kingdom, His late Majesty,

jefty, upon their humble Petition, was graciously pleased in 1733, through the favourable Interposition of His Grace the Duke of *Dorset*, Lord Lieutenant, to grant His Royal Charter of Incorporation for the Erecting and Supporting of Schools, wherein the Children of Papists and other poor Natives might be instructed in the *English* Tongue and the Principles of true Religion and Loyalty, and trained up to the Practice of Industry and Labour.

In Purfuance of which, Charter-Schools have from time to time been erected in several Parts of the Kingdom, under the Direction of the Society; who have the Satisfaction to observe that their Scheme of dividing the Children's Time between the Learning necessary for their future State of Life, and such gentle Work as is suited to their present tender Age, hath been successfully adopted by many Charity-Schools in *Dublin* and other Places; whereby the Benefit of the Institution hath probably been extended far beyond the Expectation of those who at first most warmly promoted it. But there is one Part of their Discipline peculiar to the Society, the Necessity of which ariseth  
from

from the peculiar Circumstances of the Children whom they receive into their Care ; which is, the transplanting of them into such Schools as are most remote from their Popish Relations. This is their standing and invariable Rule ; and the more effectually to secure its good Success, they do not fail to recommend to the several Local Committees, and strictly to enjoin the School-Masters, by all possible Means to guard against and prevent an Intercourse or Communication between the Children and any of the Priests, or other Popish Inhabitants, in the Neighbourhood of the Schools.

The great Assistances, whereby the Society have from time to time been enabled to carry this extensive Design into Execution, have been annually published, not only for the Information of the Public, but in Gratitude to the pious and charitable Benefactors.

His late Majesty was graciously pleased in the Year 1739, to honour the Society with his Royal Countenance by a Donation of One thousand Pounds, and an Annual Grant of the like Sum on the Establishment of this Kingdom. And His present Majesty has likewise been graciously pleased to continue to the Society

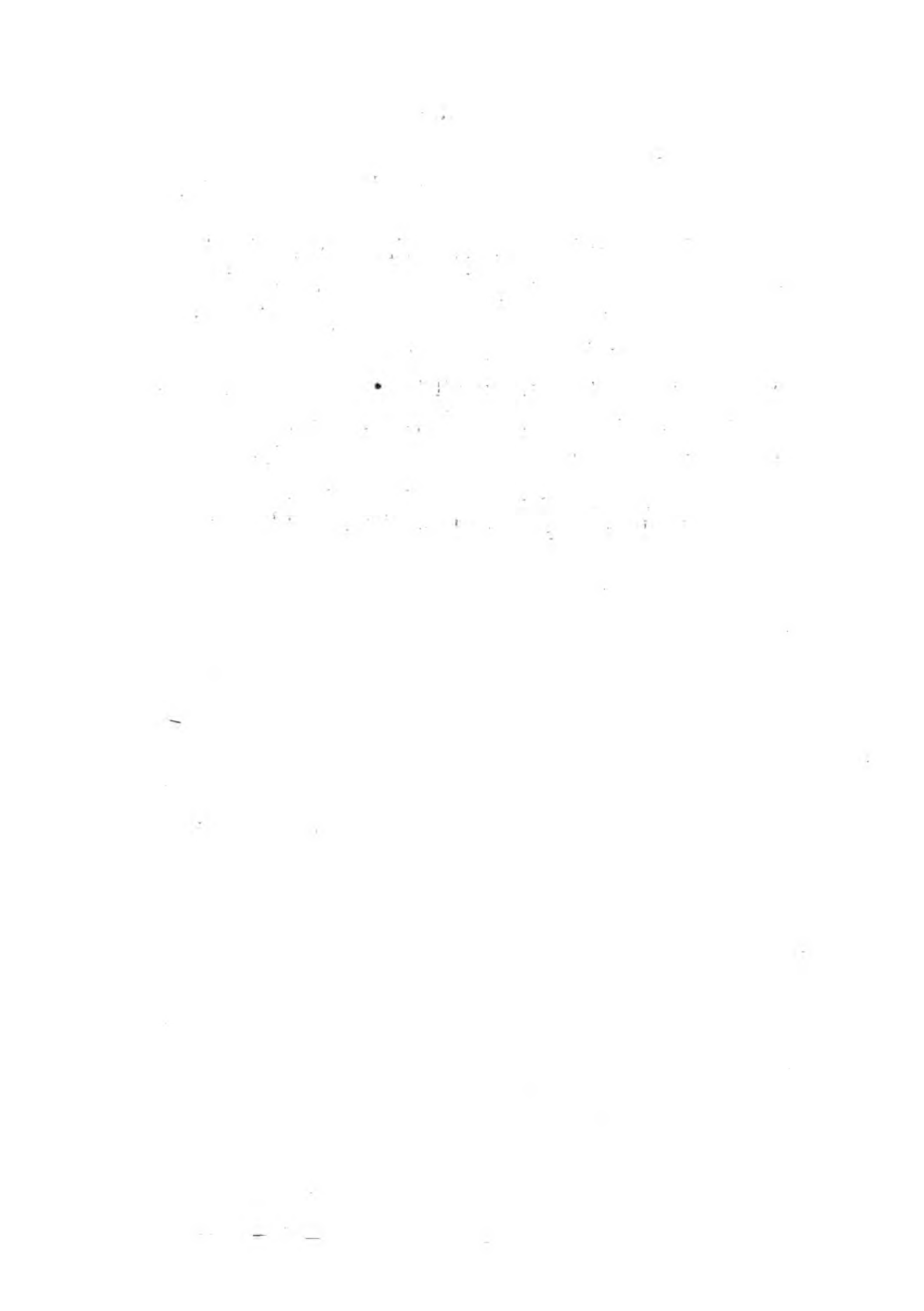
ty the same Mark of His Royal Favour ; which they humbly beg Leave, with the most respectful Duty, thankfully to acknowledge.

The Parliament of *Ireland*, with that laudable Zeal for the Advancement of the Protestant Religion and the Benefit of their Country, with which their Proceedings have ever been distinguished, have also been pleased to take the Society under their Protection, and to grant to their Use the Produce of a Tax on Hawkers and Pedlars, as well as several considerable Sums of Money, which have enabled the Society to encrease the Number of their Schools, and to erect Nurseries for the Reception of Children too young to be admitted into the Schools.

The Contributions of private Persons, both in *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, have also been very considerable; as may appear by the annual Account of Subscriptions and Donations received, and the Erection and Endowment of the several Schools. From the Commencement of the Society to *November 1761* the Sum of Thirty six thousand six hundred and forty two Pounds  
Three

Three Shillings and Six Pence hath been remitted by the Corresponding Society in *London* ; to whose zealous and most useful Endeavours for promoting this Charitable Institution, as well by communicating their Sentiments and Advice upon all Occasions, as by contributing and procuring Benefactions, the Society are too highly indebted, not to embrace with the greatest Pleasure, every Opportunity of professing their Obligations, and returning their most hearty Thanks.

# ACCOUNT OF THE SCHOOLS.

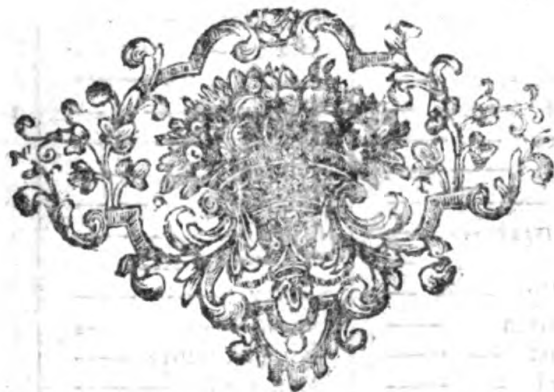
