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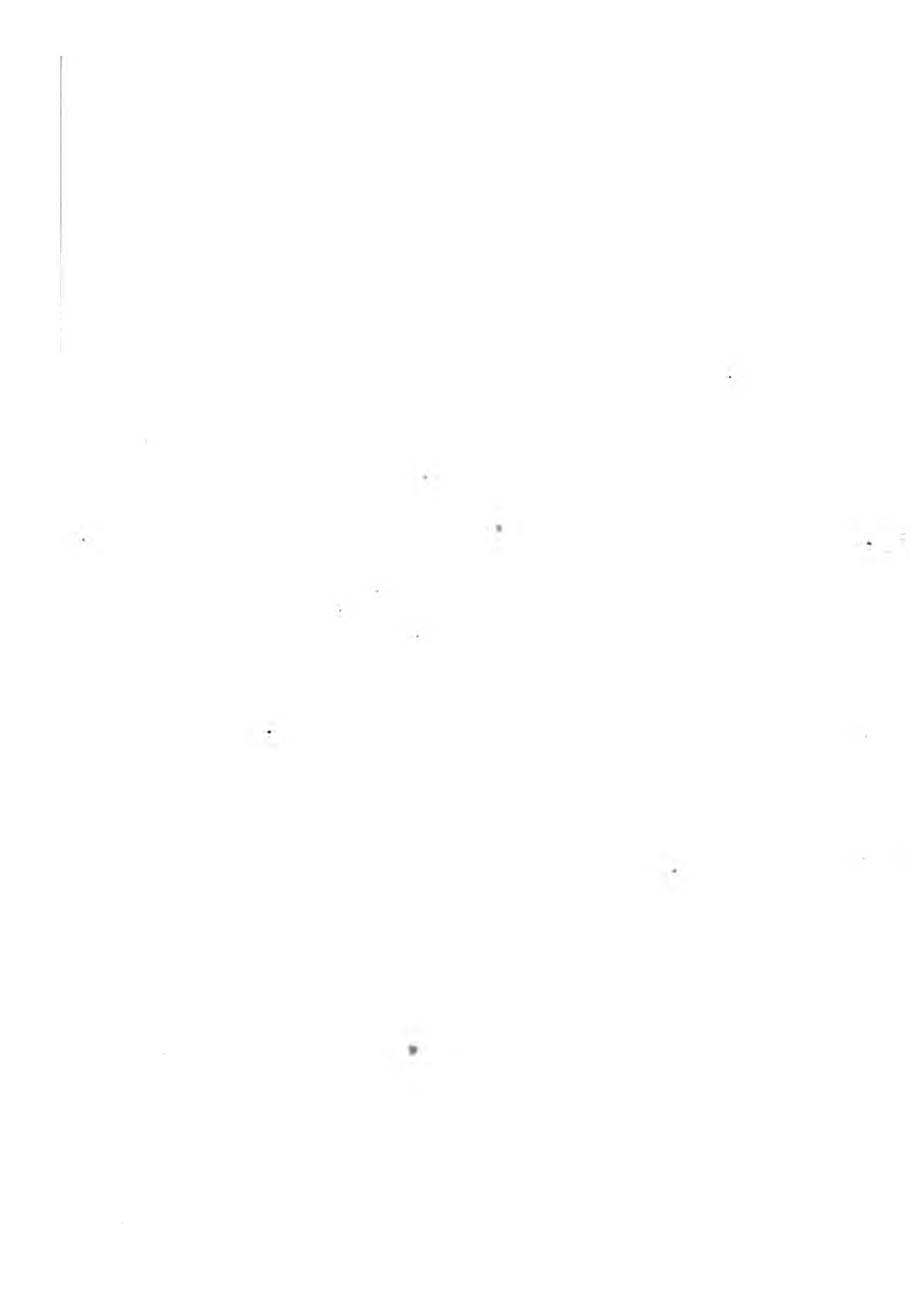
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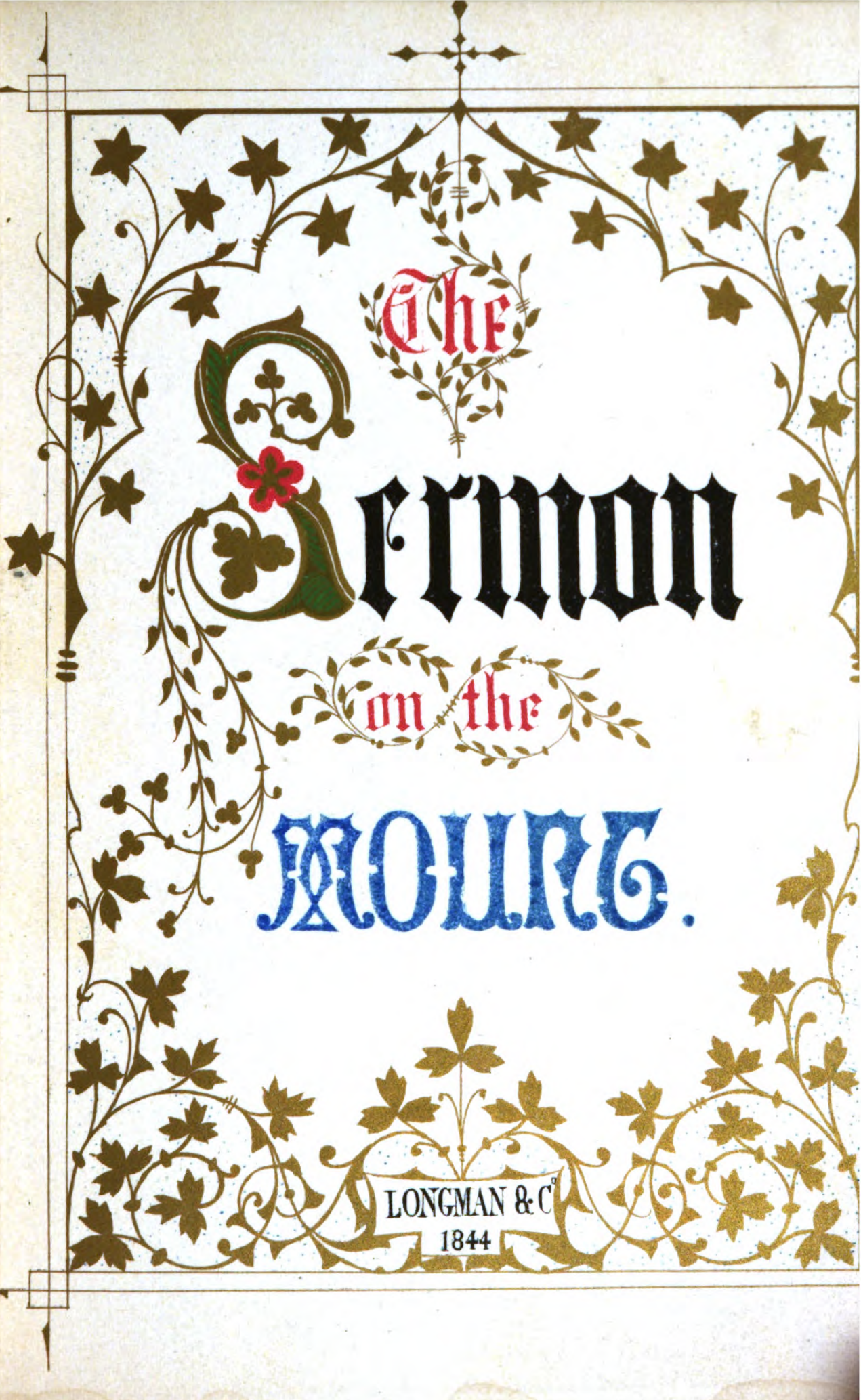



for they shall see **G**od.




Blessed are the peacemakers:

you.




Ye are the salt of the earth:

Father which is in heaven.




Think not that I am come to

and Pharisees, ye shall in no case




enter into the kingdom of heaven.

Therefore, if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee;




Leave there thy gift before

the uttermost farthing.


Ye have heard that it was said

cast into hell.




It hath been said, **W**hosoever shall put away his wife, let him give her a writing of divorcement:

But **I** say unto you, **S**wear not at all; neither by heaven: for it is **G**od's throne:




Nor by the earth; for it is

thine enemy.




But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you;

And if ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others? do not even the Publicans so?



unto you, **T**hey have their reward.


But when thou doest alms,

After this manner therefore
pray ye:

Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.

earth, as it is in heaven. **G**ive




us this day our daily bread, and
forgive us our debts, as we for-
give our debtors. **A**nd lead us
not into temptation, but deliver
us from evil: **F**or thine is the
kingdom, and the power, and
the glory, for ever: **Amen**

For if ye forgive men their
trespasses, your heavenly
Father will also forgive you.

But if ye forgive not men
their trespasses, neither
will your **F**ather forgive
your trespasses.

Moreover, when ye fast, be
not, as the hypocrites, of a
sad countenance: for they
disfigure their faces, that they




may appear unto men to fast. **V**erily
I say unto you. **T**hey have their reward

But thou, when thou fastest
anoint thine head, and wash
thy face;

That thou appear not unto
men to fast, but unto thy
Father which is in secret:
and thy **F**ather, which seeth in
secret, shall reward thee openly.

Lay not up for yourselves
treasures upon earth, where
moth and rust doth corrupt
and where thieves break through
and steal:

But lay up for yourselves
treasures in heaven, where
neither moth nor rust doth




corrupt, and where thieves do not
break through nor steal:

For where your treasure is,
there will your heart be also.

The light of the body is the
eye: if therefore thine eye
be single, thy whole body
shall be full of light.

But if thine eye be evil, thy
whole body shall be full of
darkness. If therefore the
light that is in thee be darkness,
how great is that darkness!

No man can serve two mas-
ters: for either he will
hate the one, and love the
other; or else he will hold to the




one, and despise the other. **Ye**
cannot serve **God** and mammon

Therefore **I** say unto you,
Take no thought for your

what ye shall drink; nor yet for
your body, what ye shall put on.

Behold the fowls of the air:
for they sow not, neither
do they reap, nor gather
into barns; yet your heavenly
Father feedeth them. **Are** ye not
much better than they?

Which of you by taking
thought can add one cubit
unto his stature?




And why take ye thought
for raiment? Consider the
lilies of the field, how they
grow; they toil not, neither do
they spin:

And yet I say unto you,
That even Solomon in all
his glory was not arrayed
like one of these.

Wherefore, if God so clothe
the grass of the field, which
to-day is, and to-morrow is
cast into the oven, shall he not
much more clothe you, O ye of
little faith?

Therefore take no thought,
saying, What shall we eat?
or, What shall we drink? or,
Wherewithal shall we be clothed?




For after all these things do the **G**entiles seek:) for your heavenly **F**ather knoweth that ye have need of all these things.

Judge not, that ye be not judged.




For with what judgment ye

mote out of thy brother's eye.




Give not that which is holy

bread, will he give him a stone?




Or if he ask a fish, will he

can a corrupt tree bring




forth good fruit.


done many wonderful works?

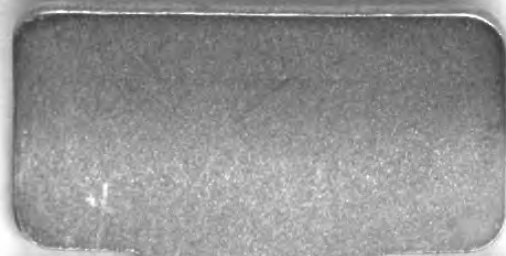
