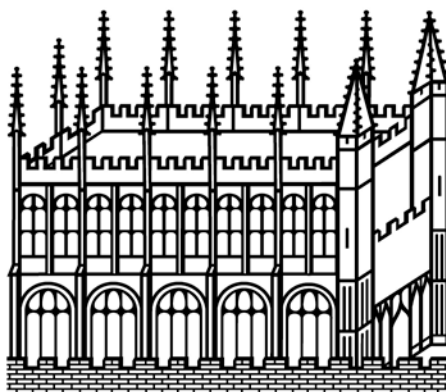

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I desire to offer myself as Candidate for the post of Examiner in Zoology for the Degree in Medicine.

During my undergraduate course at Edinburgh University, I was awarded the Sibbald Bursary, was Prizeman in more than one class, gained several First-Class Certificates, and finally graduated Master of Arts in 1894.

When studying further for the degree of Bachelor of Science, I was Medallist in Zoology, Botany, and Geology, graduated in 1897, and was awarded a Gunning Victoria Jubilee Prize in 1899.

After working in the Zoological Laboratory at Edinburgh under Professor Cossar Ewart, I proceeded to Cambridge, where, during the summers of 1899 and 1900, I conducted further original researches under Mr Adam Sedgwick. These were incorporated in a Thesis entitled "Observations on some Outstanding Features of Protozoan Life," which obtained for me the Edinburgh Doctorate of Science in January 1901.

In the summer of 1900 I was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh.

In the previous year I was appointed to the Lectureship on Natural Science in the United Free Church College, Glasgow, and in 1901 was selected to conduct the newly-established courses of Lectures in Botany and Zoology in the Free Church Training College, Glasgow.

At the recent Glasgow Meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, I served as one of the Secretaries in the Zoological Section.

I append a list of Publications, and submit for your consideration four Testimonials from zoological authorities, together with a letter from a distinguished former member of the Glasgow professoriate.
