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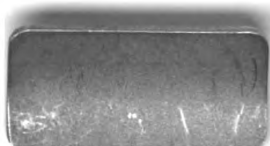

INTITULED

An Act to confirm a Scheme of the Charity Commissioners A.D. 1910.
for the management of various Charities in the City
and County of the City of Norwich.

WHEREAS the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales,
in their report to His Majesty of their proceedings during
the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, have reported that
they have approved and certified a scheme for the management
5 of various charities in the city and county of the city of Norwich,
or in certain areas therein respectively, particulars of which
charities are specified in the First Schedule to this Act :

And whereas it is expedient that the Scheme, as the same
is fully set out and defined in the Second Schedule to this Act,
10 should be confirmed :

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty,
by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and
Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled,
and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

15 **1.** The said Scheme as amended is hereby confirmed :
Provided always, that nothing in this Act or in the said Scheme
shall be held to interfere with the ordinary jurisdiction over
endowed charities now exercisable, or hereafter to become
exercisable, by the High Court of Justice and the Charity
20 Commissioners.

2. This Act may be cited as the Norwich Charities Scheme
Confirmation Act, 1910.

SCHEME FOR THE APPLICATION OR MANAGEMENT OF
THE CHARITIES SPECIFIED IN THE FIRST
SCHEDULE TO THIS ACT.

1. *Administration of Charities.*—The above-mentioned Charities and the endowments thereof specified in the First Schedule to this Scheme, 15 and all other the endowments (if any) of the said Charities shall be administered so as to give effect to the following provisions :—The Norwich Town Close Estate Charity and its endowments shall be administered by a body of trustees consisting of the persons for the time being holding office under this Scheme on the body of trustees herein-after 20 constituted (each of whom for the time being shall be an ex-officio trustee of the said Norwich Town Close Estate Charity), and eight representative trustees appointed by the freemen of the city of Norwich. Subject to this provision the said Norwich Town Close Estate Charity and its endowments shall continue to be administered in all respects 25 in conformity with the existing Schemes affecting the same. The Barnham Broom Estate shall be administered as a separate estate charity by the body of trustees herein-after constituted, subject to and in conformity with the provisions of this Scheme. The remaining above-mentioned Charities and their endowments shall be consolidated and 30 shall be administered by the body of trustees herein-after constituted, subject to and in exclusive conformity with the provisions of this Scheme, under the title of the Consolidated Charities. In this Scheme, except where the context may otherwise require, the expression “the Charities” shall mean the Barnham Broom Estate and the Consolidated 35 Charities.

VESTING AND TRANSFERS.

2. *As to Freeholds or Leaseholds.*—Any rentcharges and freehold or leasehold lands and other hereditaments belonging to or held in

trust for the Charities, and not already vested in "the official trustee of charity lands," are hereby vested in the said official trustee for all the estate and interest therein so belonging or held in trust. A.D. 1910.

3. *As to Copyholds.*—The right to call for a surrender of any copyhold lands and hereditaments belonging to or held in trust for the Charities and to be admitted as tenants thereof on the court rolls of the manor or manors of which the same are held, shall forthwith vest in such of the persons herein-after appointed to be the first co-optative trustees under this Scheme as the trustees may select. So long as any property of the Charities is of copyhold tenure, the trustees shall from time to time on the determination of office of the last survivor of the tenants on the said rolls of such property take all proper steps to obtain the admittance of a competent number of co-optative trustees as such tenants.
4. *As to Stock and Cash.*—The trustees shall (unless otherwise directed) take all proper steps for obtaining a transfer into the name of "the official trustees of charitable funds" of any sum of stock specified in the said First Schedule standing to an account in the High Court of Justice (Chancery Division), and any cash standing to the same account. Subject as aforesaid, all sums of stock belonging to or held in trust for the Charities and not already held by the said official trustees, shall be transferred, under the authority of a further order of the Charity Commissioners, into the name of the said official trustees; and all sums of cash now or at any time belonging to or held in trust for the Charities and not needed for immediate working purposes shall (unless otherwise directed) as soon as possible be invested, under the like authority, in that name.

TRUSTEES.

5. *Trustees.*—The body of trustees for the administration of the Charities shall (except at first as herein-after provided), when complete, consist of twenty-four competent persons, being—

Sixteen representative trustees, and
Eight co-optative trustees.

6. *Representative Trustees.*—The representative trustees shall be appointed as follows:—

- Eleven by the council of the city of Norwich;
Two by the board of guardians of the Norwich Poor-law Union, or the body for the time being exercising the functions of that board;
One by a body consisting of a joint committee of the governing bodies of the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital and the Jenny Lind Infirmary for Children, duly constituted and empowered for that purpose;

A.D. 1910.

One by the Norwich and District Trades and Labour Council ;
and

One by the medical board of the friendly societies of Norwich.

Each appointment shall be made for a term of three years, except
in the case of a casual vacancy occurring otherwise than by effluxion 5
of time, and shall be made at a meeting convened and held according
to the ordinary practice of the appointing body. The chairman of
the meeting shall forthwith cause the name of each person appointed
to be notified to the trustees or their clerk. The person appointed
may be, but need not be, a member of the appointing body. On a 10
casual vacancy in the office of representative trustee occurring as
aforesaid, the trustee appointed to fill the vacancy shall hold office
only for the unexpired residue of the term of office of the trustee in
whose place he is appointed.

7. *First Representative Trustees.*—The first representative trustees 15
shall be appointed as soon as possible after the date hereof, and their
names shall be notified to the town clerk of the city of Norwich on
behalf of the trustees.

8. *Co-optative Trustees.*—The co-optative trustees shall be persons
residing or carrying on business in the city and county of the city of 20
Norwich or within seven miles thereof.

9. *First Co-optative Trustees.*—The following persons shall be the
first co-optative trustees under this scheme, and shall be entitled,
subject to the provisions herein-after contained with respect to
determination of trusteeship, to hold office for life :— 25

10. *Future Co-optative Trustees.*—Every future co-optative trustee shall be appointed for life by a resolution of the trustees to be passed at a special meeting.

- 15 11. *Declaration by Trustees.*—No person shall be entitled to act as a trustee, whether on a first or any subsequent entry into office, until after signing in the minute book of the trustees a declaration of acceptance and of willingness to act in the trusts of this Scheme.

- 20 12. *Determination of Trusteeship.*—Any co-optative trustee who ceases to be qualified as aforesaid, any representative or co-optative trustee who is absent from all meetings of the trustees and of any committee of the trustees during a period of one year, and any trustee who is adjudicated a bankrupt, or who is incapacitated from acting, or who communicates in writing to the trustees a wish to resign, shall
25 thereupon cease to be a trustee.

13. *Vacancies.*—Upon the occurrence of a vacancy the trustees shall, at their next meeting, cause a note thereof to be entered in their minute book, and in the case of a vacancy in the office of representative trustee shall cause notice thereof to be given as soon
30 as possible to the proper appointing body. The appointing body may, if they think fit, before receiving such notice appoint a representative trustee to fill a prospective vacancy, provided the appointment is made within four months before the vacancy occurs. Any competent trustee may be re-appointed. No vacancy in the office of co-optative trustee
35 shall be filled till after the lapse of one calendar month from its occurrence, and there shall be no such vacancy until the number of co-optative trustees is reduced below eight.

14. *Temporary Provision.*—Until the expiration of the first three calendar months from the date of this Scheme, or such further period
40 as may be sanctioned in writing by the Charity Commissioners, the present trustees shall remain unaltered and shall retain such powers as will enable them to administer the Charities in the meantime in accordance with the existing trusts affecting them respectively, but on

A.D. 1910. — the day of such expiration they shall become ipso facto discharged from office, and the administration of the Charities shall pass to the body of trustees constituted by this Scheme. The first meeting of that body shall be summoned by the town clerk as soon as possible after the date of such expiration, or, if he fails to summon a meeting 5 for one calendar month after that date, by any two trustees.

MEETINGS AND PROCEEDINGS OF TRUSTEES.

15. *Ordinary Meetings.*—The trustees shall hold at least two ordinary meetings in each year.

16. *Chairman and Vice-Chairman.*—The trustees shall at their 10 first ordinary meeting in each year elect two of their number to be chairman and vice-chairman respectively of their meetings for the year. They shall make regulations for supplying the place of either of them in case of death, resignation, or absence. The chairman and vice-chairman shall always be re-eligible. 15

17. *Special Meetings.*—A special meeting may at any time be summoned by the chairman or vice-chairman or any four trustees upon four days' notice being given to all the other trustees of the matters to be discussed.

18. *Quorum.*—There shall be a quorum when seven trustees are 20 present at a meeting.

19. *Voting.*—Every matter shall be determined by the majority of votes of the trustees present and voting on the question. In case of equality of votes the person acting as chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote, whether he has or has not previously voted on 25 the same question, but no trustee shall in any other circumstances give more than one vote.

20. *Minutes and Accounts.*—A minute book and books of account shall be provided and kept by the trustees. All proper accounts in relation to the Charities shall in each year be made out and audited 30 by a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales or of the Society of Accountants and Auditors, and shall be certified in such manner as the Charity Commissioners require, and copies thereof shall be transmitted to the said Commissioners, and published in conformity with the provisions of the Charitable Trusts 35 Acts. Copies of the accounts so transmitted shall be sent to the town clerk of the city of Norwich for the information of the city council and for public inspection.

21. *General Power to make Regulations.*—Within the limits prescribed by this Scheme the trustees shall have full power from time 40

to time to make regulations for the management of the Charities, and A.D. 1910.
for the conduct of their business, including the summoning of meetings,
the deposit of money at a proper bank, the custody of documents,
and the appointment of a clerk and other necessary officers at such
5 rates of remuneration as the trustees may think fit.

22. *Power to delegate Functions to Committees.*—The trustees may
appoint any committees of their own body and may delegate any of
their powers to any such committee with or without power to act
without reference to the trustees. All proceedings of a committee shall
10 be reported to the trustees.

MANAGEMENT OF REAL PROPERTY.

23. *Allotments Extension Act, 1882.*—The trustees shall let and
otherwise manage in conformity with the provisions of the Allotments
Extension Act, 1882, such of the lands belonging to the Charities as
15 are subject to the provisions of the fourth section of that Act. The
trustees may set apart and let in allotments in the manner prescribed
by and subject to the provisions of the said Act any portion of the
lands belonging to the Charities other than buildings and the appur-
tenances of buildings.

24. *Management and Letting of Property.*—Subject as aforesaid,
all the property of the Charities not required to be retained or occupied
for the purposes thereof shall be let and otherwise managed by the trustees.
The trustees shall not create any tenancy in reversion after more than
three years of any existing term, or for more than 21 years certain,
25 or for less than the improved annual value at rack-rent, without the
sanction of the Charity Commissioners or a competent court. Any lease,
agreement, conveyance, deed, or other document which shall have been
previously agreed to or approved by a majority of the trustees present
at any meeting or at any committee to which there has been delegated
30 power to deal with the matter pursuant to clause 22 hereof and shall
be signed by five trustees shall be binding upon all.

25. *Leases.*—The trustees shall provide that on the grant by them
of any lease the lessee shall execute a counterpart thereof; and every
lease shall contain covenants on the part of the lessee for the payment of
35 rent and all other usual and proper covenants applicable to the property
comprised therein, and a proviso for re-entry on non-payment of the
rent or non-performance of the covenants.

26. *Repair and Insurance.*—The trustees shall keep in repair
and insure against fire all the buildings of the Charities not required
40 to be kept in repair and insured by the lessees or tenants thereof.

APPLICATION OF INCOME.

27. *Expenses of Management.*—The trustees shall first defray—

- (1) The cost of repairs and insurance, and all other charges and outgoings payable in respect of the property of the Barnham Broom Estate, out of the income of that charity; 5
- (2) The like costs, charges, and outgoings payable in respect of the property of the Consolidated Charities out of the income of those charities;
- (3) All the proper costs, charges and expenses of and incidental to the joint administration and management of all the charities out of the income thereof, but so that the amount to be contributed towards the same out of the income of the Barnham Broom Estate shall be a fixed yearly sum of 2*l.* 10

28. *Specific Payments.*—The trustees shall make out of the income of the Charities the several yearly payments specified in the first column of the Second Schedule to this Scheme, to the persons specified in the second column of that schedule. 15

Provided that as soon as may be after this Scheme takes effect the said official trustees of charitable funds shall transfer to separate accounts in their books sums of consols sufficient at the time of transfer to provide by the dividends thereof for those of the said several yearly payments which are specified in the first column of Part I. of the said Second Schedule, and such sums of consols shall, from and after the transfer thereof, be in full satisfaction of the yearly payments for the provision whereof the same respectively have been transferred. 20 25

29. *Remaining Net Yearly Income.*—The net yearly income of the Charities remaining after the payments aforesaid shall be applied by the trustees in the manner and to the objects herein-after prescribed.

BRANCHES.

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30. *Branches.*—For the purpose of the administration of the almshouses belonging to the Charities and the net yearly income of the Charities remaining as aforesaid, the Charities shall be administered in branches as follows:—

- (1) The almshouse branch, consisting of the several almshouse buildings belonging to the Charities and a yearly sum of 1,200*l.* out of the said net yearly income; 35
- (2) The pension branch, consisting of a yearly sum of 600*l.* out of the said net yearly income;
- (3) The loan branch, consisting of the sum of cash outstanding on loans at the date of this Scheme in respect of the 40

above-mentioned Charities called or known as the charity A.D. 1910,
loans and a yearly sum of 100*l.* out of the said net
yearly income ;

- 5 (4) The apprenticing branch, consisting of a yearly sum of 500*l.*
out of the said net yearly income ;
- (5) The poor's branch, consisting of the residue of the said net
yearly income.

As to the Almshouse and Pension Branches.

31. *Almshouse.*—The almshouse buildings belonging to the Charities
10 and the property heretofore occupied therewith shall be appropriated
and used for the residence of the almspeople in conformity with the
provisions of this Scheme.

32. *Absence from Almshouse.*—No almsperson shall be absent for
a period exceeding 24 hours from the almshouse in which he or she
15 resides, except with the consent in writing of the trustees, or their
clerk ; but in special cases such consent may, for any sufficient
reason, be given retrospectively after the absence has occurred.

33. *Rooms not to be Let.*—No almsperson shall be permitted to
let or part with the possession of the room or rooms allotted to him
20 or her, or, except with the special permission of the trustees, to
suffer any stranger to share the occupation of the same or of any
part thereof.

34. *Matrons and Nurses, &c.*—The trustees may, if they think fit,
whenever the income of the Charities suffices for the purpose, appoint
25 matrons or nurses, dismissible at their pleasure, to perform such
duties as may be necessary for the superintendence and care of the
almspeople, at such salaries as they may think fit, and may allot to the
matrons or nurses rooms in the almshouses as residences while they
hold office. Provided that nothing herein shall prejudice the legitimate
30 interests of the existing superintendent of Doughty's Hospital. The
trustees may provide medical attendance for the almspeople, and such
medicines and medical or surgical appliances as may be necessary.

35. *Saving for existing Almspeople and Pensioners.*—Appointments
of almspeople and pensioners under this Scheme shall be made without
prejudice to the interests of existing almspeople and pensioners.

36. *Qualifications of Almspeople and Pensioners.*—The almspeople
and pensioners shall be poor persons of good character, who have resided
in the city and county of the city of Norwich for not less than four years
next preceding the time of their appointment, and who from age,
40 ill-health, accident, or infirmity, are wholly or in part unable to maintain
themselves by their own exertions : Provided that no person shall be
disqualified on account of having received poor law relief prior to the

A.D. 1910. — time of his appointment notwithstanding any rule of law laid down by the High Court of Justice to the contrary.

37. *Stipends, &c., of Almspeople and Pensioners.*—There shall be paid to each almsperson and to each pensioner out of the income of the almshouse and pension branches respectively, by weekly or other periodical payments as the trustees think fit, such a stipend as the trustees may from time to time fix, having regard to the needs and circumstances of the respective almspeople and pensioners and to the income and other circumstances of the Charities: provided that the trustees, instead of paying the whole amount of the stipend to any almsperson or pensioner in money, may from time to time expend the whole or any portion thereof for his or her benefit as they think fit. The trustees may also provide fuel, lighting, clothes and washing for the almspeople. 5 10

38. *Payment of Stipends and Conduct of Inquiries.*—The clerk of the trustees shall pay the stipends to the almspeople and pensioners, and he or some other person appointed by the trustees for the purpose shall conduct any inquiries with regard to the almspeople and pensioners and to applicants for appointment. 15

39. *Notice of Vacancy.*—No appointment of an almsperson or a pensioner shall be made by the trustees until a sufficient notice (which may be according to the form annexed hereto) of the vacancy to be filled up, specifying the qualifications required from candidates, has been published in the city and county of the city of Norwich by advertisement or otherwise, so as to give due publicity to the intended appointment; provided that such notice shall not be required in the case of a vacancy occurring within a period of six calendar months next after the publication of a notice under this clause, or in the case of an appointment of the widow of an almsperson upon a vacancy caused by his death. Every applicant must be prepared to produce sufficient testimonials and other evidence of his or her qualification for the appointment. 20 25 30

40. *Applications for Appointment.*—Applications for appointment as almspeople or pensioners shall be made in the first place in writing to the trustees or their clerk, in such manner as the trustees prescribe. Except in case of physical disability, the trustees shall, before appointing any applicant to be an almsperson or a pensioner, require him or her to attend in person. 35

41. *Appointments of Almspeople and Pensioners.*—Every appointment of an almsperson or of a pensioner shall be made by the trustees, and shall be made at a special meeting to be held as soon as conveniently may be after an interval of one month from the occurrence of the vacancy to be filled, allowing a reasonable time for publication of notice and for inquiries as to the applicants. 40

42. *Selection of Almspeople and Pensioners and Payment of Pensions.*—The almspeople and pensioners shall be selected as nearly

as practicable equally from the two sexes, and under the following A.D. 1910.
conditions :—

- 5 (1) After full investigation of the character and circumstances of the applicants, and inquiry whether they have shown reasonable providence, and whether and to what extent they may reasonably expect assistance from relations or others ;
- (2) Where claims are equal, preference shall be given to those applicants who have been longest resident in the beneficial area.
- 10 The pensions shall be paid subject to such reasonable regulations for ascertaining the identity and good conduct of the pensioners and their continued possession of the required qualifications as the trustees from time to time prescribe.
- 15 For the purpose of this clause the trustees may avail themselves of the agency of any charity organisation society, or other like agency.
43. *Term of Pensions.*—Each pension shall be granted for a term of not more than three years in the first instance, but may be prolonged by the trustees, if they think fit, for a further period of not more than three years at each prolongation.
- 20 44. *Register.*—The trustees shall provide and keep a book, in which shall be entered the name, age, and description of every person appointed to be an almsperson or a pensioner, the date of every appointment and the date and occasion of every vacancy. They shall also keep a register for all applications for appointment.
- 25 45. *Removal of Almspeople and Pensioners.*—(1) Any almsperson or pensioner who receives poor-law relief other than medical relief, shall be removed from being an almsperson or a pensioner.
- 30 (2) If, in the opinion of the trustees, any almsperson or pensioner is guilty of insobriety, insubordination, breach of regulations, or immoral or improper conduct, or is disqualified for retaining his or her appointment by having become entitled to a sufficient income from sources other than the Charities, or on account of mental disease (in the case of an almsperson) or from any other cause, or if in any case it appears that any almsperson or pensioner has been appointed
- 35 without having the required qualifications, the trustees, upon proof thereof to their satisfaction, may remove the almsperson or pensioner.
- (3) Upon the removal of any almsperson, matron, or nurse, the trustees shall take possession of the tenement or room occupied by him or her, and upon the removal of any almsperson or pensioner
- 40 the trustees may proceed to appoint another almsperson or pensioner in his or her place.
- (4) In any case of such misconduct as aforesaid the trustees may suspend the payment of the stipend to the almsperson or pensioner, either wholly or in part, during such time as they think fit.

A.D. 1910.

(5) Any almsperson removed on account of mental disease, and any pensioner removed on account of receiving poor-law relief while being detained under lawful authority as a person suffering from mental disease, may, on recovery, be re-appointed without previous notice being given of the vacancy to be filled up, and need not possess the qualifications as to residence and previous non-receipt of poor-law relief. 5

46. *Regulations.*—The trustees may from time to time prescribe such reasonable regulations as they consider expedient for the government of the almspeople and pensioners, provided that the same shall not be at variance or inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Scheme, and by such regulations may provide that the almspeople shall render such assistance to each other and to the matron or nurse as is within their power. 10

As to the Loan Branch.

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47. *Loans.*—The funds of this branch, viz., the sum of cash outstanding as aforesaid, as and when received, and the said yearly sum of 100*l.*, shall be applied by the trustees in the grant of loans to persons, to be selected for this purpose by the trustees, who have resided in the city and county of the city of Norwich for not less than four years next preceding the time of their selection, and who have started or are starting or about to start in business as tradesmen. The loans shall amount to not less than 50*l.* in each case, and shall be granted for not more than seven years, upon such terms and conditions as to sureties (if any) and repayment and otherwise as the trustees think proper. In so far as in any year the trustees cannot usefully apply the funds of this branch for the purposes thereof as herein-before directed the same shall be accumulated by them, but so that the accumulations shall be applicable from time to time for the purposes of the branch in any future year or years; provided that if and so often as an amount equivalent to 500*l.* in cash has been accumulated that amount (unless otherwise ordered) shall cease to be so applicable as aforesaid, and shall be vested under clause four hereof in the name of the said official trustees of charitable funds, in augmentation of the capital endowments of the Consolidated Charities. 20
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As to the Apprenticing Branch.

48. *Apprenticing, Outfits and Instruction.*—The yearly income of the apprenticing branch shall be applied by the trustees, under one or more of the following heads, for the benefit of such deserving and necessitous children, bonâ fide resident in the city and county of the city of Norwich, as the trustees select for the purpose:— 40

- (1) In apprenticing them to some useful trade or occupation;
- (2) In assisting them by the provision of outfits (including clothes, books, tools, travelling expenses, admission fees, or the like),

or otherwise, upon their entering, or to enable them to enter, upon a trade, profession, or occupation, or into service; A.D. 1910.

- 5 (3) In making payments for maintenance, including payments for travelling expenses to enable them to receive instruction in workshops or at classes or otherwise, so as to prepare them for further instruction or for employment.

49. *Conditions of Apprenticing.*—Upon the apprenticing of any child—

- 10 (1) An indenture of apprenticeship shall be executed containing provisions for carrying into effect the following stipulations:—

15 (a) The apprenticeship premium shall be of such amount as the trustees shall from time to time think necessary or proper, and shall be payable in not less than two portions, and the second portion and any subsequent portions shall be payable after the lapse of at least six months from the commencement of the term of apprenticeship or from the payment of the preceding portion;

20 (b) The second or any subsequent portion of the premium shall not be payable unless or until the trustees have satisfied themselves by personal inquiry that the apprentice is being properly taught;

25 (c) Substantial wages increasing yearly shall be paid to the apprentice on a scale to be specified in the indenture:

- 30 (2) The trustees may also agree for the repayment to them of the whole or any part of the apprenticeship premium out of any wages of the apprentice or otherwise; and may properly refuse to accept any master or mistress except upon the following conditions:—

35 (a) The permission of a probationary period not exceeding three months, and either with or without wages, during which the apprentice concerned shall be at liberty to recede from his or her engagement;

40 (b) The permission of access at all reasonable times to the place of employment of the apprentice concerned by any person authorised by the trustees to inspect and report upon the condition, conduct, and diligence of the apprentice;

(c) Such other conditions or stipulations as to evening instruction, or other matters as in the judgment of the trustees may be beneficial to the apprentice concerned or otherwise advantageous to the Charities :

- (3) Any or all of the arrangements for the apprenticeship and 5.
visiting of, and consequent reports upon, the apprentice,
may be delegated to the National Institution of Apprenticeship,
No. 39, York Place, Baker Street, London, W., or to
the Apprenticeship and Skilled Employment Association,
No. 36, Denison House, Vauxhall Bridge Road, London, 10
S.W., or to any similar institution which may be nominated
by the trustees and approved by the Charity Commissioners,
and in that case the moneys applicable to the apprenticeship
shall be paid to the institution at the time of the signing
of the apprenticeship indenture. 15

As to the Poor's Branch.

50. *General Benefit of Poor.*—The yearly income of the poor's
branch shall be applied by the trustees in making payments, under
one or more of the following heads, for the benefit either of the poor
of the city and county of the city of Norwich generally, or of such 20
deserving and necessitous persons resident therein as the trustees
select for this purpose, and in such way as they consider most advan-
tageous to the recipients, and most conducive to the formation of
provident habits:—

- I. Payments to an amount not exceeding 250*l.*, in any one year, 25
by way of—

(1) Subscriptions or donations in aid of the funds of
any dispensary, infirmary, hospital, or convalescent home,
whether general or special, upon such terms (so far as
may be) as to enable the trustees to secure the benefits 30
of the institution for the objects of the charities ;

(2) Contributions towards—

(a) The provision of nurses for the sick and
infirm ;

(b) The provision of duly certified midwives to 35
attend women in childbirth ;

(c) The support of any maternity society or lying-in
fund ;

(d) The travelling expenses of patients to and from
such institutions as are above-mentioned in para- 40
graph I. (1) ;

(e) The cost of providing proper care and supervision (including any necessary cost of locomotion) for poor persons requiring temporary change of air or special protection or treatment. A.D. 1910

- 5 II. Subscriptions or donations, to an amount not exceeding 100*l.* in any one year in aid of the funds of—
- (1) Any provident club or society established in or near the city and county of the city of Norwich for the supply of coal, clothing, or other necessaries;
- 10 (2) Any duly registered provident or friendly society accessible to the inhabitants of the city and county of the city of Norwich.
- III. The supply to an amount not exceeding 200*l.* in any one year of—
- 15 (1) Clothes, linen, bedding, fuel, tools, medical, or other aid in sickness, food or other articles in kind;
- (2) Temporary relief in money, by way of loan or otherwise, in case of unexpected loss, or sudden destitution.
- 20 Provided that the income of the poor's branch shall in no case be applied so that any individual or institution may become entitled to a periodical or recurrent benefit therefrom.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

25 51. *Appropriation of Benefits.*—The appropriation of the benefits of the Consolidated Charities shall be made by the trustees from time to time at meetings of their body or of any committee of their body, and not separately by any individual trustee or trustees.

30 52. *Charities not to relieve Rates.*—The funds or income of the Consolidated Charities shall not in any case be applied in aid of any rates for the relief of the poor or other purposes.

35 53. *Trustees not to be personally interested.*—No trustee shall take or hold any interest in any property belonging to the Charities otherwise than as a trustee for the purposes thereof, and no trustee shall receive any remuneration, or be interested in the supply of work or goods, at the cost of the Charities.

40 54. *Alteration of Scheme.*—The Charity Commissioners may from time to time, in the exercise of their ordinary jurisdiction, establish schemes for the alteration of any provisions of this Scheme, as if those provisions had been made by the founder in the case of a charity having a founder.

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A.D. 1910. 55. *Questions under Scheme.*—Any question as to the construction of this Scheme, or as to the regularity or the validity of any acts done or about to be done under this Scheme, shall be determined conclusively by the Charity Commissioners, upon such application made to them for the purpose as they think sufficient. 5

1.—(1) If a Money Bill, having been passed by the House of Commons, and sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the session, is not passed by the House

(3) When a Bill to which the House of Lords has not 10 consented is presented to His Majesty for assent as a Money Bill, the Bill shall be accompanied by a certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons that it is a Money Bill.

(4) No amendment shall be allowed to a Money Bill which, in the opinion of the Speaker of the House of Commons, is such 15 as to prevent the Bill retaining the character of a Money Bill.

2.—(1) If any Bill other than a Money Bill is passed by the House of Commons in three successive sessions (whether of the same Parliament or not), and, having been sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the session, 20 is rejected by the House of Lords in each of those sessions, that Bill shall, on its rejection for the third time by the House of Lords, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to His Majesty and become an Act of Parliament on the Royal Assent being signified thereto, notwithstanding that 25 the House of Lords has not consented to the Bill: Provided that this provision shall not take effect unless two years have elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the Bill in the House of Commons and the date on which it passes the House of Commons for the third time. 30

(2) A Bill shall be deemed to be rejected by the House of Lords if it is not passed by the House of Lords either without amendment or with such amendments only as may be agreed to by both Houses.

(3) A Bill shall be deemed to be the same Bill as a former 35 Bill sent up to the House of Lords in the preceding session if, when it is sent up to the House of Lords, it is identical with the former Bill or contains only such alterations as are certified by the Speaker of the House of Commons to be necessary owing to the time which has elapsed since the date of the former Bill, 40 or to represent amendments which have been made by the House of Lords in the former Bill in the preceding session.

(b) where such offence has not been committed, to set forth the substance of the offence charged against the defendant without setting forth any matter or thing which it is unnecessary to aver in the case of an indictment for a false statement or false representation punishable under this Act. A person shall not be liable to be convicted of any offence against this Act, or of any offence declared by any other Act to be perjury or subornation of perjury, or to be punishable as perjury or subornation of perjury solely upon the evidence of one witness as to the falsity of any statement alleged to be false. Corroboration.

14. On a prosecution—

(a) for perjury alleged to have been committed on the trial of an indictment for felony or misdemeanour; or
(b) for procuring or suborning the commission of perjury on any such trial, Proof of certain proceedings on which perjury is assigned.

the fact of the former trial shall be sufficiently proved by the production of a certificate containing the substance and effect (omitting the formal parts) of the indictment and trial purporting to be signed by the clerk of the court, or other person having the custody of the records of the court where the indictment was tried, or by the deputy of that clerk or other person, without proof of the signature or official character of the clerk or person appearing to have signed the certificate. An Act to confirm certain Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 relating to Ballochroy Newlyn and Ventnor. A.D. 1910.

WHEREAS a Provisional Order made by the Board of Trade under the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 is not of any validity or force whatever until the confirmation thereof by Act of Parliament: 24 & 25 Vict. c. 45.

5 And whereas it is expedient that the several Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade under the said Act and set out in the schedule to this Act be confirmed by Act of Parliament:

10 Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows:—

15 **1.** The several Orders set out in the schedule to this Act shall be and the same are hereby confirmed and all the provisions thereof in manner and form as they are set out in the said schedule shall from and after the passing of this Act have full validity and force. Confirmation of Orders in schedule.

20 **2.** The Undertakers mentioned in the Ballochroy Order by this Act confirmed shall not under the powers of this Act or of that Order purchase or acquire in any district in Scotland within the meaning of the Public Health (Scotland) Act 1897 any house or houses which on the fifteenth day of December last were occupied either wholly or partially by thirty or more persons belonging to the working class as tenants or lodgers or Special provisions as to houses of working class. 60 & 61 Vict. c. 38.

If the Undertakers acquire or appropriate any house or houses for the purposes of this Act or of that Order in contravention of the foregoing provisions they shall be liable to a 5 penalty of five hundred pounds in respect of every such house which penalty shall be recoverable by the Secretary for Scotland by action in the Court of Session and shall be carried to and form part of the Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom 10 Provided that the court may if it think fit reduce such penalty.

(2) The Newlyn Pier and Harbour Order 1906 and this Order may be cited together as the Newlyn Pier and Harbour Orders 1906 and 1910.

2. This Order shall come into operation upon the day when the Act confirming this Order is passed and that day is in this Order referred to as "the commencement of this Order." Commencement of Order.

3. In this Order the following words and expressions shall unless the context otherwise requires have the meanings herein-after assigned to them namely:— Interpretation.

"The Order of 1906" means the Newlyn Pier and Harbour Order 1906;

"The harbour" means the Harbour of Newlyn as defined by section 3 of the Order of 1906 including the works as defined by that section and the works authorised by this Order;

"The works" means the works authorised by this Order.

4. The Newlyn Pier and Harbour Commissioners shall be the Undertakers. Undertakers for carrying this Order into execution and are in this Order referred to as "the Undertakers."

Acquisition of Lands.

Preliminary.

- 5 1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Ventnor Pier Order 1910. Short title and commencement.
- (2) This Order shall come into force upon the day when the Act confirming this Order is passed and that day is in this Order referred to as “the commencement of this Order.”
- 10 2. In this Order the following words and expressions shall unless Definitions. the context otherwise requires have the meanings herein-after assigned to them namely:—
- “The Council” means the urban district council of the urban district of Ventnor;
- “The Act of 1884” means the Ventnor Local Board Act 1884;
- 15 “The pier” means and includes the existing pier and the works buildings and conveniences connected therewith belonging to the Council and the works authorised by this Order;
- “The works” means the works authorised by this Order;
- 20 “The pier undertaking” means and includes the pier and also all the right to levy rates tolls and other charges and all other rights conferred on the Council by the Act of 1884 in connexion with or in respect of the pier and by this Order and the entire undertaking of the Council in connexion with the pier;
- 25 “The pier revenue” means the revenue of the pier undertaking.
3. The Lands Clauses Acts (except so much thereof as relates to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement and to the entry upon lands by the promoters of the undertaking) are hereby incorporated with this Order and for the purpose of that Incorporation of Lands Clauses Acts.
- 30 incorporation the term “special Act” in those Acts shall mean this Order.

Undertakers.

4. The Council shall be the undertakers for carrying this Order Undertakers. into execution and shall have and may exercise the powers privileges and authorities conferred by this Order.

Acquisition of Lands.

5. The Council may by agreement purchase or take on lease Lands may be acquired by agreement. for the purposes of the pier and of this Order any additional lands

6. Notwithstanding anything in the Lands Clauses Acts or in any

and in case of sale either in consideration of the execution of works

8. Subject to the provisions of this Order and subject also to
such alterations (if any) in the plans and sections deposited with
reference to this Order as the Board of Trade may require before the
completion of the works the Council may on the lands and in the
lines and according to the levels shown on the said plans and sections 30
and within the limits shown on those plans make and maintain the
following works :—

A widening of the existing pier commencing at a point 26 feet
south of the north-western corner of the existing pier-head
thence proceeding seaward in a southerly direction for a distance 35

In constructing the works the Council may with the consent in writing of the Board of Trade deviate laterally to any extent within the limits of deviation marked on the deposited plans and may with the like consent deviate vertically to any extent from the levels shown in the deposited sections.

10. Subject to the provisions of this Order the works shall for the purposes of rates and for all other purposes be deemed to be part of the pier undertaking of the Council as if they had been authorised by the Act of 1884.

New works to be part of pier undertaking.

11. Every person who wilfully obstructs any person acting under the authority of the Council in setting out the lines of the works or who pulls up or removes any buoys moorings poles posts lights beacons or other conveniences shall for every offence be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and shall in addition be liable to repay to the Council any expenses incurred by them in making good such damage.

Penalty for injuring works.

12.—(1) If within two years from the commencement of this Order the works are not substantially commenced the powers given by this Order for executing the works or otherwise in relation thereto shall cease unless the time for commencement is extended by the special direction of the Board of Trade.

Powers to cease in certain events.

(2) If the works after having been substantially commenced are virtually suspended for twelve consecutive months the powers given by this Order for executing the works or otherwise in relation thereto shall cease except as to so much of the works as is then completed unless those powers are by the special direction of the Board of Trade continued and directed to remain in force for any period not exceeding five years from the commencement of this Order.

(3) In either of the above cases a certificate from the Board of Trade to the effect that the works have not been substantially commenced or that they have been virtually suspended for twelve consecutive months shall for the purposes of this Order be conclusive evidence of the facts stated in that certificate.

13. No part of the works below high-water mark shall be commenced without the consent in writing of the Board of Trade having been previously obtained and those works shall be executed only in accordance with the terms of such consent.

Consent of Board of Trade to works below high-water mark.

14.—(1) The Council may with the consent of the Board of Trade deepen dredge scour and excavate any portion of the foreshore and bed of the sea to the extent necessary to secure a sufficient waterway and approach to the pier for vessels using the same.

Power to dredge.

(2) All sand mud and materials dredged up under the powers contained in subsection (1) of this section shall be the property of the

Council who may from time to time sell or otherwise dispose of the same or remove or deposit the same as they may think fit Provided that no sand mud or other materials shall be laid down or deposited in any place below high-water mark without the consent in writing of the Board of Trade having been first obtained. 5

(3) All money arising from any sale or other disposition of sand mud and other materials under this section after payment of the expenses connected therewith shall be applied in the same manner as the pier revenue.

Power to purchase dredgers &c.

15. The Council may provide purchase take on lease hire and use such steam or other dredgers eroders engines lighters or other vessels machinery and apparatus as they may think necessary for effecting the purposes of the Act of 1884 or this Order and may let the same on hire for such sums and upon and subject to such terms and conditions as they may think fit or may sell or dispose of the same All sums received in respect of any such letting on hire shall be deemed to form part of the pier revenue and all moneys realised by any such sale shall be deemed to be money received on capital account within the meaning of the section of this Order of which the marginal note is "Proceeds of sale of surplus lands to be treated as capital" and be dealt with and applied in the manner provided by that section. 15 20

Rates.

Power to levy rates.

16. Sections 25 and 26 of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 shall not be incorporated with this Order.

Power to vary exemptions and compound for rates.

17. The Council may confer vary or extinguish exemptions from and compound with any person with respect to the payment of rates or charges authorised by the Act of 1884 but so that no preference be in any case given to any person over any other person using the pier under the like circumstances and that anything done under this section shall not prejudice the other provisions of the Act of 1884. 25 30

Power to lease rates and other charges.

18.—(1) The Council may with the previous consent in writing of and upon such terms conditions and restrictions and for such period as may be sanctioned by the Board of Trade lease to any company corporation or person the rates and other charges authorised to be taken by the Act of 1884 or this Order in respect of the pier. 35

(4) The Council shall within one month after the date of any lease made under this section deposit a certified copy thereof respectively with the Board of Trade and shall as from the expiration of that month be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every week or part of a week during which they refuse or neglect to comply with this subsection.

(5) No lease made under this section shall be made in consideration or part consideration of any fine premium or other capital sum.

(6) Nothing in this section shall exempt the Council from their obligation to keep and render accounts and as from the date of any lease made under this section all the provisions of the Acts incorporated with this Order and of the Act of 1884 and of this Order as to the keeping and delivery of accounts in respect of the pier undertaking shall apply to and be binding upon as well the lessees as the Council and all moneys received by the Council under or in respect of any such lease shall be deemed to be moneys levied by virtue of and income received under this Order.

The Council may let for hire or lease for any term not exceeding seven years any pavilions rooms shops sheds warehouses or other buildings separately from any other part of the undertaking to any company corporation or person upon such terms pecuniary or otherwise and under such restrictions and conditions as they think fit. Power to
lease pavilions &c.

20.—(1) The Council may on any special occasion but not exceeding twelve days in any one year or for more than three days consecutively close the pier against the public and may if they think fit on such occasions admit any persons to the pier on payment of such special rates of admission not exceeding one shilling for each person as the Council may think fit. Power to
close pier on
special occasions.

(2) On all such occasions the Council shall reserve a sufficient passage along the pier from the landing steps to the shore for any persons landing or embarking at the pier the reserved passage to be open for use by those persons at the ordinary charge and without payment of any special rates so long only as they use the pier as a passage and do not remain upon it.

(3) The special rate charged under this section shall be in lieu of and not in addition to the rate specified in the schedule to the Act of 1884 and any person paying the special rate shall not be liable to pay

A.D. 1910. any further or other rate or sum for admission to the pier on the day
for which the special rate is charged.

(4) The Council shall give notice of their intention to close the pier under this section by exhibiting the notice conspicuously at the entrance to the pier during at least two days before the day on which the pier is to be closed. 5

Power to borrow.

21.—(1) The Council may independently of any other borrowing power from time to time borrow at interest not exceeding five per centum per annum— 10

- (A) for the construction of the works authorised by this Order any sum or sums not exceeding in the whole seven thousand five hundred pounds;
- (B) with the consent of the Board of Trade such further sum or sums as may from time to time be required for any of the purposes of the pier undertaking; and 15
- (C) such sum as may be required for the payment of the taxed costs charges and expenses of this Order.

(2) In order to secure the repayment of money borrowed for the purposes mentioned in this section and the payment of interest thereon the Council may mortgage or charge as well the district fund and the general district rate as the pier revenue. 20

Periods for repayment of money borrowed.

22. All moneys borrowed by the Council under this Order shall be repaid within the respective periods following (in this Order referred to as "the prescribed periods") (that is to say):— 25

- (A) As to the money borrowed for the purposes (A) and (B) mentioned in the last preceding section of this Order within such period not exceeding forty years from the date of borrowing the same as the Board of Trade may prescribe.
- (B) As to the money borrowed for the purpose (C) mentioned in the last preceding section within five years from the commencement of this Order. 30

Provisions of Public Health Act as to mortgages to apply.

23.—(1) The following sections of the Public Health Act 1875 shall extend and apply to mortgages granted under this Order (that is to say):— 35

- Section 236 (Form of mortgage);
- Section 237 (Register of mortgages);
- Section 238 (Transfer of mortgages);
- Section 239 (Receiver may be appointed in certain cases).

Protection of lenders.

24. A person lending money to the Council shall not be concerned to enquire as to the observance by the Council of any provisions of this Order or be bound to see to the application or be answerable for any loss misapplication or non-application of the money lent. 40

25. The Council shall pay off all moneys borrowed by them on mortgage under the powers of this Order either by equal yearly or half-yearly instalments of principal or of principal and interest combined or by means of a sinking fund or partly by such instalments and partly by a sinking fund and the payment of the first instalment or the first payment to the sinking fund shall be made within twelve months if by yearly repayments or within six months if by half-yearly repayments after the date of borrowing the sum in respect of which the payment is made.

Sinking fund.

(2) The yearly sums so appropriated and set apart shall be invested from time to time and accumulated in the way of compound interest by investing the same and the dividends interest and annual income thereof respectively in any security in which trustees are by law authorised to invest or in mortgages stocks debentures or other securities issued by any local authority as defined in section 34 of the Local Loans Act 1875 (other than securities of the Council and securities transferable by delivery).

(3) The Council may at any time apply the whole or part of the sinking fund in or towards the repayment of the borrowed moneys for the repayment of which it was set aside in such order and manner as they deem proper Provided that in such case they pay into such sinking fund in each year afterwards and accumulate as herein-before prescribed until the whole of such borrowed moneys are discharged a sum equal to the interest which would have been produced by the sinking fund or the part thereof so applied at the rate per centum per annum on which the equal annual payments to the sinking fund are based had the sinking fund or such part thereof as aforesaid not been so applied.

(4) If and so often as the income of the sinking fund is not equal to the income which would be derived from the amount invested if the same were invested at the prescribed rate any deficiency shall be made good by the Council.

(5) If and so often as the income of the sinking fund is in excess of the income which would be derived from the amount invested if

BE it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

- 5 **1.**—(1) Where premises are held under a lease to which this Act applies upon trust to be used for the purposes of a place of worship or for purposes connected therewith, whether in conjunction with other purposes or not, the trustees, notwithstanding any agreement to the contrary, shall be entitled as
10 incident to their leasehold interest to enlarge that interest into a fee simple, and for that purpose to acquire the freehold and all intermediate reversions :
- Right of trustees holding leasehold interest in place of worship to acquire freehold.

Provided that—

- 15 (a) if the premises exceed two acres in extent the trustees shall not be entitled to exercise such right in respect of more than two acres thereof;
- 20 (b) this Act shall not apply where the premises are used or are proposed to be used for the purposes of a place of worship in contravention of any covenant contained in the lease.

- (2) The leases to which this Act applies are leases (including underleases and agreements for leases or underleases), whether granted or made before or after the *passing of this Act*, for lives or a life or for the unexpired residue of any term originally
25 created for a period of not less than twenty-one years, whether determinable on a life or lives or not.

An Act to facilitate the grant to members of the Constabulary of one day's rest off duty in every seven. A.D. 1910.

BE it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

- 5 **1.**—(1) The police authority of any county or borough in England or Wales as respects which this Act is for the time being in force shall make such arrangements as to the hours of duty of constables that every constable (not being above the rank of inspector) shall be allowed at least fifty-two days in a year on
10 which he is not required to perform police duty, save on occasions of public emergency, and for such days being distributed throughout the year with the object of securing, so far as practicable, to every such constable one day's rest in every seven.
- 15 (2) This Act shall not come into force as respects any police authority until such date as may be fixed by the authority, but if this Act has not come into force as respects the police authority of any county borough maintaining a separate police force before the expiration of four years from the passing of

And whereas it is requisite that the said Order should be confirmed by Parliament :

- 10 **1.** The Provisional Order set out in the schedule to this Act shall be and the same is confirmed and all the provisions thereof in manner and form as they are set out in the said schedule shall from and after the passing of this Act have full validity and force. Confirmation of Order.
- 15 **2.** This Act may be cited as the Port of London (Port Rates on Goods) Provisional Order Act 1910. Short title.

PORT OF LONDON (PORT RATES ON GOODS)

Provisional Order pursuant to Section 13 of the Port of London Act 1908 embodying the Schedule of Maximum Port Rates on Goods which may be levied by the Port of London Authority.

- Short title. 1. This Order may be cited as the Port of London (Port Rates on Goods) Order 1910.
- Commencement of Order. 2. This Order shall come into force and have effect on a day to be fixed by the Board of Trade not being more than thirteen weeks from the date of the confirmation of this Order. 10

Subject to the provisions of this Order and to any exemptions or rebates allowed by the Port of London Authority (in this Order referred to as "the Authority") under section 13 of the Port of London Act 1908 the Authority may demand and take in respect of all goods imported from parts beyond the seas or coastwise into the Port of London or exported to parts beyond the seas or coastwise from that Port port rates not exceeding the rates specified in the schedule to this Order : 20
Provided that no port rates shall be charged by the Authority on fish caught in the open sea and brought in a fresh condition into the Port of London direct from the fishing grounds. 25
- As to import rates on raw materials and manufactured goods. 5. In fixing from time to time the port rates to be levied under this Order and any exemptions and rebates allowed by the Authority in respect thereof the Authority shall endeavour so far as they consider practicable to adjust the same so as to ensure that the import rates on the materials used in the manufacture of any article shall not be more than the import rates on a like manufactured article imported from parts beyond the seas and that an unfair proportion of the burden of port rates is not thrown upon the river trade having regard to the circumstances of the Port at the time. 30

8. No port rates shall be charged for bunker coal for steamer's own use on board any steamer entering or leaving the port and the Authority shall repay any port rates paid on coal imported which shall be used for the purpose of bunkering steamers proceeding beyond the limits of the Port of London.

9. No port rates shall be charged by the Authority on transshipment goods which expression wherever used in this Order means and includes goods imported for transshipment only and also goods which remain on board the vessel in which they were imported for conveyance therein to another port.

A.D. 1910. expression whenever used in this Order shall include the shipper and consignee of the goods and any person shipping or taking delivery of the goods on behalf of the owner shipper or consignee) or under the hand of a forwarding agent or of any other agent acting on behalf of the owner of the goods or under the hand of the owner master 5 managers or agents of the importing or exporting vessel and shall be in such form as the Authority may from time to time require The certificate stating that the goods have been intended for transshipment shall contain particulars of the description quantity destination route and mode of conveyance of such goods and shall be delivered to the collector 10 (which expression as used in this Order means any collector or officer for the time being authorised by the Authority to collect port rates on goods) within seven days from the arrival of the goods or such further period as shall from time to time be appointed by the Authority The certificate stating that the goods have been shipped again as 15 soon as practicable as aforesaid shall contain such particulars as the Authority shall require and shall be delivered to the collector at or immediately after the time of shipment The owner of any such goods as aforesaid shall at all times give such other information and evidence as may reasonably be required by the Authority or their agent in 20 order to prove that such goods were intended for transshipment or have been shipped again as soon as practicable as aforesaid as the case may be.

Further exemptions or rebates.

10. Nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to limit or affect the right of the Authority to allow any further or other exemp- 25 tions or rebates which may lawfully be allowed by them under the provisions of the Port of London Act 1908 and the Authority shall on being satisfied that such further or other exemptions or rebates are necessary to protect the waterborne trade or the entrepôt trade of the Port of London make such further exemptions or rebates as are 30 necessary for the purpose.

Classification of unspecified goods.

11. Any goods not specified in the schedule to this Order shall for the purpose of payment of port rates be classed by the Authority under the same head as the goods specified in the said schedule which shall in the opinion of the Authority be most similar thereto in nature 35 value and quality and the rate for the time being chargeable for such last-mentioned goods shall accordingly be chargeable by the Authority in respect of the goods first-mentioned and all necessary additions shall be made to the lists of port rates from time to time published by the Authority pursuant to section 39 hereof Provided always that any 40 person aggrieved by any such classification as aforesaid may at any time appeal in writing to the Board of Trade against the same and the Board of Trade may make such order on any such appeal as to

(3) If the full quantities when ascertained and known shall be less than the quantities specified in such bill and entry any excess of port rates paid thereon shall (subject to the provisions of clause hereof) be repaid to the owner of the goods or other person by whom the same shall have been paid.

When any goods are intended to be unshipped within the limits of the Port of London the master of the vessel containing such goods shall within twelve hours after the arrival of such vessel within the limits aforesaid or so soon thereafter as is practicable deliver to the collector the best statement in his power of the name of the consignee of the goods intended to be unshipped or other person to whom the same are to be delivered and if the whole cargo be intended to be unshipped a copy of the bill of lading or manifest of the cargo or if there is no such bill of lading or manifest or if part only of the cargo be intended to be unshipped the best account in writing in his power of the kinds quantities and weights measurements or values according to the denominations in the schedule to this Order of the several goods intended to be unshipped and shall also if required so to do by the collector give to him twelve hours notice (or if that is impracticable such less notice as is reasonably practicable) of the time at which the cargo of such vessel or any part of the same is intended to be unshipped and if the master of any such vessel shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this section or shall deliver or give any false particulars or notice he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

If any difference arise between the collector and the owner of any goods or other person liable to pay the port rates thereon in respect of which port rates are payable concerning the kinds quantities weights measurements or values of the goods in respect of which such rates are payable the collector may cause all such goods to be weighed 5 measured or examined as the case may be and for this purpose the goods shall if required by either party to the difference be landed at the dock or wharf for which they are entered or if not so entered at the dock or wharf where the ship is discharging or if the ship is discharging in the river at a wharf to be named by the master of the 10 vessel.

Expenses of landing weighing &c. of goods. 19. If the weight or quantity of any goods in respect of which port rates are payable shall be greater than that shown by or the descriptions measurements or values of any such goods shall be incor- 15 rectly given in the bill delivered by the owner of the goods or other person liable to pay the port rates thereon the expenses of the landing and delivery weighing measuring or examination as the case may be shall be paid to the Authority by the owner of the goods or such other person and shall be recoverable by the same means as port 20 rates but if the weight or quantity of such goods shall be the same or less than or the descriptions measurements or values shall agree with that shown by the bill so delivered the Authority shall pay all the expenses of such landing and delivery weighing measuring or examination and shall also pay to the owner of the goods or such other person all the expenses occasioned by such landing and delivery 25 weighing measuring or examination as the case may be.

Copy of manifest of exported goods to be delivered. 20. The owner charterer chartered owner consignee broker agent or other person acting in the loading or clearing of any exporting vessel shall prepare a manifest of all goods exported from the Port of London by such vessel setting forth the marks numbers and descrip- 30 tions of the packages and the names of the shippers thereof according to the bills of lading (if any) relating thereto and shall sign and leave at one of the collecting offices of the Authority within fourteen days after such vessel shall have cleared outwards a correct transcript of the manifest so prepared and on failure to prepare such manifest 35 and to sign and deliver such transcript as aforesaid such owner charterer chartered owner consignee broker agent or other person as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Power to distrain goods in case of default. 21. If default be made in the payment of the port rates payable in respect of any goods then without prejudice to any other rights 40 or remedies conferred by this Order the collector may distrain or arrest of his own authority such goods and for that purpose may

enter any vessel or place within the limits of the Port of London in which the goods may be with such assistance as he shall deem necessary or if the said goods have been removed without payment of such rates he may distrain or arrest any other goods within the limits of the Port of London belonging to the person liable to pay such rates and may sell the goods so distrained or arrested and out of the proceeds of such sale pay the port rates due to the Authority rendering the overplus if any to the person entitled thereto on demand or the Authority may recover such rates by action in any court having competent jurisdiction Provided always that the power to distrain arrest and sell goods under this provision shall not be exerciseable in respect of any goods liable to forfeiture under section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act 1876 or any enactment amending or extending that section and that the collector shall before making any such distress or arrestment as aforesaid pay all duties which may be payable to His Majesty in respect of the goods so intended to be distrained or arrested and he may retain the amount of duties so paid out of the proceeds arising from the sale of such goods And provided also that the said power shall not be exerciseable in respect of any such other goods as aforesaid on which all port rates have been paid or security therefor given and which are upon any quay wharf or warehouse regulated by the Legal Quays Regulation Acts 1846 and 1847 (9 & 10 Vict. c. ccxcix. and 10 & 11 Vict. c. cc.) or by the Sufferance Wharves Regulations Acts 1848 and 1858 (11 Vict. c. xviii. and 21 & 22 Vict. c. xli.).

22. In weighing and measuring goods for ascertaining the port rates payable in respect of goods the weight and measurement of the packing shall be included. Weight &c. of packing to be included.

23. Any fraction of a penny in the total amount of port rates payable at one time by any person shall be charged as one penny. Fractions of a penny.

24.—(1) If the owner of any goods imported into or exported out of the Port of London or any other person liable to pay port rates thereon or any clerk or servant acting for or on behalf of such owner or other person shall by any means whatsoever at any time elude or evade or attempt to elude or evade or neglect or omit to pay any port rates on goods or any part of any such rates or shall furnish false information to any person with a view to eluding or evading any such payment every person eluding or evading or attempting to elude or evade or neglecting or omitting to make payment as aforesaid or furnishing any such false information as aforesaid shall be liable to pay to the Authority by way of damages in addition to such rates a sum equal to the rates so eluded or evaded or attempted to be eluded or evaded or neglected or omitted to be paid and shall also be liable to pay by way of penalty for each such offence a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

Penalties for evasion of payment of port rates.

A.D. 1910. (2) If the owner or master of any vessel containing goods imported coastwise into the Port of London shall allow any of such goods to be landed or delivered overside before the port rates payable thereon shall have been paid or the payment thereof secured as hereinbefore provided or if the owner or master of any vessel in which goods are intended to be exported coastwise from the Port of London shall allow any of such goods to be shipped without a receipt for the port rates thereon or a permit for the shipping of such goods in either case signed by or on behalf of the collector having been produced to him he shall be liable to pay to the Authority by way of damages a sum equal to the port rates on the goods so landed delivered overside or shipped as the case may be and shall also be liable by way of penalty for each such offence to a sum not exceeding ten pounds. 5 10

Penalties to extend to principals. 25. All penalties to which clerks or servants are rendered liable by the last preceding section of this Order for any act neglect or omission in respect of which a penalty is imposed by that section shall extend to the principals on whose account or for whose profit or advantage such act neglect or omission shall have been done or made. 15

Payment of port rates not a release from penalties incurred. 26. The tender to or acceptance by the Authority or any of their officers of any port rate the payment of which has been previously evaded or left unpaid shall not release or discharge any person from any liability or penalty consequent upon such evasion or non-payment. 20

Persons acting in good faith not liable to penalties. 27. Nothing herein contained shall render the master owner charterer chartered owner consignee broker or agent of a vessel or wharfinger liable to penalties under this Order in respect of any act or default where it shall be proved that he has acted in good faith and with reasonable care in reliance upon information furnished to him by the owner of the goods to which such act or default shall relate or by any person whom he shall reasonably have supposed to represent such owner as broker or agent. 25 30

Agreement with Customs and Excise. 28. The Authority on the one hand and the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise on the other hand may from time to time enter into carry into effect vary and rescind agreements and arrangements with respect to the collection and recovery of port rates on goods and any matters incidental thereto Provided always that no such agreement or arrangement shall infringe the provisions of section 13 of the Port of London Act 1908. 35

Wharf weights and measurements to be accepted. 29. Subject to the provisions of section 19 of this Order in the case of goods landed or warehoused with wharfingers the wharf weights and measurements taken in the customary manner shall be accepted by the Authority for the purposes of the port rates on goods 40

or arrangements shall be made for the Authority to check weights or A.D. 1910.
measurements of such goods at the wharf premises.

30. In the event of the owner of any goods liable to pay any port rates to which those goods are subject not having paid or given
5 security for payment of those rates by the following times viz.:— **Owner or master of vessel may pay port rates.**

(1) In the case of goods other than coastwise goods—

(a) if a time for the delivery of the goods is expressed in the charter party bill of lading or agreement then by the time so expressed;

10 (b) if no time for the delivery of the goods is expressed in the charter party bill of lading or agreement then by the expiration of seventy-two hours exclusive of a Sunday or holiday from the time of the report of the ship;

15 (2) in the case of coastwise goods when the same are ready to be discharged;

the owner or master of the vessel in which the goods are carried may himself pay such rates and thereupon shall have a lien on the goods and all the rights powers and liabilities in respect of the same that he would have under Part VII. of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 in
20 respect of unpaid freight or other charges and for this purpose the provisions of the said Part VII. shall be deemed to apply to all goods imported by sea into the Port of London.

31. Where goods are to be delivered to a public wharfinger or carrier he may pay the port rates to which they are liable on behalf
25 of the owner or consignee of the goods and thereupon shall have the like lien on the goods as he would have in respect of charges for the safe custody or carriage of the goods. **Public wharfinger or carrier may pay port rates.**

32. The Authority may make special arrangements respecting the time and method of payment of port rates on goods by any persons
30 who at frequent intervals become liable to pay such rates whether on their own account or on account of any other person. **Special arrangements for time and method of payment of port rates.**

33. The Authority may enter into agreements with any shipowner wharfinger or carrier providing that such shipowner wharfinger or carrier shall collect for and on behalf of the Authority the port rates on goods
35 imported or exported in his vessel or to be landed or shipped by him as the case may be and may agree to pay to such shipowner wharfinger or carrier a collecting commission. **Agreements with shipowner or wharfinger for collection of port rates.**

In case such shipowner wharfinger or carrier shall pay to the Authority any such rates before he has collected the same from the owner of the
40 goods he shall possess the like rights and remedies for the recovery of such rates as are conferred by sections 30 and 31 respectively of this Order.

- A.D. 1910. Authority to permit goods to be discharged upon receiving security. 34. Notwithstanding anything in this Order contained the Authority shall in all cases permit goods to be discharged and delivered or shipped as the case may be upon receiving security to the satisfaction of the Authority by bond or such other security as the Authority may approve for the payment of the port rates thereon notwithstanding that such port rates have not been paid and upon such security being given by the owner or master of a vessel or wharfinger or carrier he shall have a lien on the goods for the amount of the port rates thereon and shall possess the like rights and remedies for the recovery of such rates as are conferred by sections 30 and 31 respectively of this Order. 5 10
- Claims for repayment of port rates. 35. Any person claiming the return of the whole or any part of any moneys paid in respect of any port rates on goods shall make such claim and produce all documents and give all information reasonably required in proof of such claim within twelve months from the time of the entry of such goods and in default thereof the whole sum paid shall belong to the Authority. 15
- Saving for Government stores. 36. Nothing in this Order contained shall affect any Act of Parliament relating to His Majesty's duties of Customs and Excise or any other revenue of the Crown or shall extend to charge with port rates any mail bag as defined by the Post Office Act 1908 or any naval victualling or War Department stores or other stores or goods for the service or being the property of His Majesty or goods being under seizure by the officers of revenue or the baggage of any officers or persons employed in the service of the Admiralty War Department Customs and Excise or Post Office or of any troops landed upon or disembarked from any quay within the Port of London. 20 25
- Saving for Rivers Medway and Swale. 37. Nothing in this Order contained shall be construed as imposing any port rates on any goods carried in any vessel by reason only that the vessel passes through any part of the Port of London on a voyage between places situate on the River Medway or the River Swale and not within the Port of London and any other places not within that Port. 30
- Recovery of penalties. 38. All offences under this Order made punishable by any penalty may be prosecuted under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts The court imposing any penalty under this Order may direct that the whole or any part thereof be applied in or towards the payment of the costs of the proceedings or in or towards the rewarding of the person on whose information or at whose suit the penalty is recovered and subject to any such direction all penalties under this Order shall be paid into the Exchequer. 35 40
- Publication of list of port rates. 39. A list of the port rates for the time being payable shall be open during all reasonable hours to the inspection of any person

(2) The port rates charged on goods (other than coal culm patent fuel coke coal dust and cinders) exported coastwise shall not exceed one half of the port rates for the time being actually charged on similar goods either imported coastwise or exported to parts beyond the seas whichever rate may be the lower.

(3) The port rates charged on coal culm patent fuel coke coal dust and cinders respectively exported coastwise shall not exceed one half of the port rates for the time being actually charged on coal culm patent fuel coke coal dust and cinders respectively imported coastwise.

(4) In this section only references to import and export coastwise shall be deemed to include references to import from and export to respectively the Isle of Man and the islands of Guernsey Jersey Alderney and Sark.

8. No port rates shall be charged for bunker coal for steamer's own use on board any steamer entering or leaving the port and the Authority shall repay any port rates paid on coal imported which shall be used for the purpose of bunkering steamers proceeding beyond the limits of the Port of London.

9. No port rates shall be charged by the Authority on transhipment goods which expression wherever used in this Order means and includes goods imported for transhipment only and also goods which remain on board the vessel in which they were imported for conveyance therein to another port.

For the purposes of this section the expression "goods imported for transhipment only" shall mean goods imported from beyond the seas or coastwise for the purpose of being conveyed by sea only to any other port whether beyond the seas or coastwise which are certified and proved within the period and in manner herein-after provided (1) to have been intended for transhipment at or before the time of the report of the ship at the Custom House or within seventy-two hours thereafter excluding Sundays and holidays and (2) to have been shipped again as soon as practicable within the limits of the Port of London for conveyance by sea to such other port. Every such certificate as aforesaid shall be under the hand of the owner of the goods (which

A.D. 1910. — expression whenever used in this Order shall include the shipper and consignee of the goods and any person shipping or taking delivery of the goods on behalf of the owner (shipper or consignee) or under the hand of a forwarding agent or of any other agent acting on behalf of the owner of the goods or under the hand of the owner master managers or agents of the importing or exporting vessel and shall be in such form as the Authority may from time to time require. The certificate stating that the goods have been intended for transshipment shall contain particulars of the description, quantity, destination, route and mode of conveyance of such goods and shall be delivered to the collector (which expression as used in this Order means any collector or officer for the time being authorised by the Authority to collect port rates on goods) within seven days from the arrival of the goods or such further period as shall from time to time be appointed by the Authority. The certificate stating that the goods have been shipped again as soon as practicable as aforesaid shall contain such particulars as the Authority shall require and shall be delivered to the collector at or immediately after the time of shipment. The owner of any such goods as aforesaid shall at all times give such other information and evidence as may reasonably be required by the Authority or their agent in order to prove that such goods were intended for transshipment or have been shipped again as soon as practicable as aforesaid as the case may be.

Further exemptions or rebates.

10. Nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to limit or affect the right of the Authority to allow any further or other exemptions or rebates which may lawfully be allowed by them under the provisions of the Port of London Act 1908 and the Authority shall on being satisfied that such further or other exemptions or rebates are necessary to protect the waterborne trade or the entrepôt trade or any other trade of the Port of London make such further exemptions or rebates as are necessary for the purpose.

Classification of unspecified goods.

11. Any goods not specified in the schedule to this Order shall for the purpose of payment of port rates be classed by the Authority under the same head as the goods specified in the said schedule which shall in the opinion of the Authority be most similar thereto in nature, value and quality and the rate for the time being chargeable for such last-mentioned goods shall accordingly be chargeable by the Authority in respect of the goods first-mentioned and all necessary additions shall be made to the lists of port rates from time to time published by the Authority pursuant to section 39 hereof. Provided always that any person aggrieved by any such classification as aforesaid may at any time appeal in writing to the Board of Trade against the same and the Board of Trade may make such order on any such appeal as to

(A) If such goods other than coastwise goods are to be discharged in the docks of the Authority the owner or master of the vessel may but shall not be bound to land the same on the quay at any time at which he is entitled to land or unship the same. Goods so landed shall not by reason only of such landing become subject to any charges payable to the Authority but the Authority may detain the said goods and the collector of customs and excise may with the consent of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise refuse to permit an entry to be passed for the removal of the said goods from the quays of the Authority:

the owner or master of the vessel in which the goods are carried may himself pay such rates and thereupon shall have a lien on the goods and all the rights powers and liabilities in respect of the same that he would have under Part VII. of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 in respect of unpaid freight or other charges and for this purpose the provisions of the said Part VII. shall be deemed to apply to all goods imported by sea into the Port of London.

31. Where goods are to be delivered to a public wharfinger or carrier he may pay the port rates to which they are liable on behalf of the owner or consignee of the goods and thereupon shall have the like lien on the goods as he would have in respect of charges for the safe custody or carriage of the goods.

Public wharfinger or carrier may pay port rates.

32. The Authority may make special arrangements respecting the time and method of payment of port rates on goods by any persons who at frequent intervals become liable to pay such rates whether on their own account or on account of any other person.

Special arrangements for time and method of payment of port rates.

33. The Authority may enter into agreements with any shipowner wharfinger or carrier providing that such shipowner wharfinger or carrier shall collect for and on behalf of the Authority the port rates on goods imported or exported in his vessel or to be landed or shipped by him as the case may be and may agree to pay to such shipowner wharfinger or carrier a collecting commission.

Agreements with shipowner or wharfinger for collection of port rates.

40 In case such shipowner wharfinger or carrier shall pay to the Authority any such rates before he has collected the same from the owner of the goods he shall possess the like rights and remedies for the recovery of such rates as are conferred by sections 30 and 31 respectively of this Order.

Claims for repayment of port rates. 35. Any person claiming the return of the whole or any part of any moneys paid in respect of any port rates on goods shall make such claim and produce all documents and give all information reasonably required in proof of such claim within twelve months from the time of the entry of such goods and in default thereof the whole sum paid shall belong to the Authority. 15

Saving for Government stores. 36. Nothing in this Order contained shall affect any Act of Parliament relating to His Majesty's duties of Customs and Excise or any other revenue of the Crown or shall extend to charge with port rates any mail bag as defined by the Post Office Act 1908 or any naval victualling or War Department stores or other stores or goods for the service or being the property of His Majesty or goods being under seizure by the officers of revenue or the baggage of any officers or persons employed in the service of the Admiralty War Department Customs and Excise or Post Office or of any troops landed upon or disembarked from any quay within the Port of London. 20 25

Saving for Rivers Medway and Swale. 37. Nothing in this Order contained shall be construed as imposing any port rates on any goods carried in any vessel by reason only that the vessel passes through any part of the Port of London on a voyage between places situate on the River Medway or the River Swale and not within the Port of London and any other places not within that Port. 30

Recovery of penalties. 38. All offences under this Order made punishable by any penalty may be prosecuted under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts The court imposing any penalty under this Order may direct that the whole or any part thereof be applied in or towards the payment of the costs of the proceedings or in or towards the rewarding of the person on whose information or at whose suit the penalty is recovered and subject to any such direction all penalties under this Order shall be paid into the Exchequer. 35 40

Publication of list of port rates. 39. A list of the port rates for the time being payable shall be open during all reasonable hours to the inspection of any person

And whereas the interest and instalments of principal due in respect of the loan having fallen into arrear, the Public Works Loan Commissioners, on the tenth day of November eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, entered into possession of the dwellings, and, the weekly rents proving insufficient after payment of expenses of management, maintenance, and repairs to meet their claim for interest and principal, with the consent of the Treasury on the third day of June eighteen hundred and ninety-two, sold the property for eight thousand seven hundred and fifty pounds :

And whereas by section two of the Public Works Loans Act, 1902, the sum of three thousand one hundred and one pounds five shillings, being the difference between the outstanding balance of the loan (amounting to eleven thousand eight hundred and fifty-one pounds five shillings) and the sum so realised by the sale, was written off from the assets of the local loans fund, but remained a personal liability of the said Richard Lawrence Cosh :

And whereas the said Richard Lawrence Cosh has recently died leaving no available estate to meet the debt, which is therefore irrecoverable :

Therefore the said principal debt, so far as not repaid, together with all claims for interest thereon, is hereby extinguished, and the amount of the said debt and of any arrears of interest therein shall be deemed a free grant from Parliament.

5. Section twenty-five of the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891 (which empowers the Irish Land Commission to obtain possession of a holding which they are entitled to cause to be sold for non-payment of any sum due to them), shall apply as if the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland were mentioned therein, in addition to the Irish Land Commission.
